Central Oregon Small Farm Interactive Website

The Central Oregon Small Farm Network is in the process of developing an interactive website which will serve farmers and end-users while connecting multiple agencies within Central Oregon. The web will mirror Local Harvest's directory; allowing farmers to create personal web pages and connect to potential CSA (if applicable) members. Additionally, it will have tools allowing more efficient sourcing within the region and will involve local chefs, small business owners, schools and others' participation to prepare for a local food shift through the next few years. There will be opportunities to connect with other producers for collaborative purchasing power, knowledge-sharing and will allow users to gain information on current legislation/processes and agricultural events.

This website will also connect individuals with educational and grant opportunities and will focus on helping businesses and schools obtain and run community gardens. In short, this effort will establish a framework to accommodate and attract new and pre-existing farmers by enabling more efficient distribution channels and greater cooperation within the community. Alfalfa Intensive Training Seminar

The Alfalfa Intensive Training Seminar will be held on November 17-19, 2009 at the University Place Conference Center and Hotel, Indianapolis, IN. The seminar is taught by Extension Forage Specialists and USDA Dairy Research Center personnel from Kentucky, Wisconsin, California, Idaho, and Minnesota. There will be 11.5 certified crop advisor credits offered.

Dormant Alfalfa Herbicide Timing

Fall is here and Winter is on its' way. Producers who are growing clean alfalfa hay might want to seriously consider applying their dormant alfalfa herbicide treatments this Fall, after the plants are dormant. For the last two alfalfa variety trials we've conducted (1998 and 2003 Planting dates), we switched from late winter / early spring herbicide applications on our alfalfa trials at COARC, to Fall applications. We have been getting excellent weed control with Fall applications, and we have not had to deal with any spring burn down of alfalfa that one sometimes has to accept, if the herbicide application is done too late in spring.

In some alfalfa herbicide trials in the 1990's at COARC, it was documented that if the timing was too late in the spring (for whatever the reason), a producer might be giving up as much as a half of ton of alfalfa hay per acre, because of the burn down to the growing foliage. When that happens, it is growing season time (and yield) lost, and you can never get it back. The other interesting find from those trials, was that the negative herbicide effect carried over into the 2nd cutting with another loss in yield of about a fifth to a quarter of a ton of hay per acre.

If you have applied your herbicides to your dormant alfalfa in the late winter/ early spring for years, or have never applied in the Fall, you might want to try this on a few fields and compare them to your fields that are spring applied. We have been adding 0.5 lb a.i. of paraquat or gramoxone to the mix (with whatever main herbicide you are using) and are getting excellent weed control, actually, better weed control.
