## Tree School on the Umpqua is March 29, 2012

Tree School is back in Douglas County and will be held Thursday, March 29, 2012, on the campus of Umpqua Community College just north of Roseburg. This mini-college features 24 classes on a wide variety of topics of interest to family forestland owners, professional foresters, loggers, arborists, teachers, and the general public.

The day-long event offers classroom and field sessions taught by Extension foresters, professional foresters, and other resource management professionals. Classes vary in length from 1.5 to 3.5 hours and you can participate in up to four over the course of the day.

During breaks and lunch you will want to check out the on-site portable sawmill demonstration. Snacks and a great lunch are included in your registration to keep your energy level high!

**Registration must be done in advance by March 16 (no walk-ins allowed)**, so act now to reserve your spot in this fun and informative forestry program. The registration fee is just \$50 per person or \$90 per couple. This year, late registration is available from March 19 through March 23, however the fee will go up to \$70 after March 16. Bring the family so you can take advantage of as many class offerings as possible. ## 5B Web Soil Survey: A Tool to Help you Manage Your Forest and Agriculture Land

A soil survey is an inventory of the different soil types and their location in the county. The Web Soil Survey is a useful web-based tool that was created, and is maintained, by the Natural Resource and Conservation Service. You can use several methods for choosing a location including: an address, or Section Range and Township, or Latitude and Longitude. An aerial photo is available so you can select your area of interest. Information is available about what soils are present, their characteristics, agriculture or forest productivity, suitability for using heavy equipment, and much more. However, the Web Soil Survey is not always easy to use. If you think that this type of information would be valuable for you and you are not familiar with the Web Soil Survey, this workshop might be just what you are looking for. Come prepared to work through an example with Jim, and if we have time, locate your

## 6A/B Forestry Potpourri

This class will tie together several management considerations in a field setting. The class will feature stand improvement approaches, including tree selection based on vigor, form, species and other considerations. We'll also cover spacing, species differences and slash disposal options. Pruning trees in the forest is done to reduce wildfire risk, improve the "look" of the forest, and create clear wood over time. We'll talk about where pruning is appropriate for different situations and objectives, as well as the when and how, and demonstrate the equipment used for pruning. Last but not least, what about wildlife? We'll use the local conditions to describe and discuss wildlife and fish management opportunities. Also, tools and incentives will be discussed that help you identify priority wildlife species and habitat on your property and create management alternatives.

There will also be a short discussion on the common tree diseases of Western Oregon relating to "urban" trees. They seek trees that are weakened by overstocking, disease (e.g. dwarf mistletoe or root rots), drought or other damage. Under the right circumstances, some beetles are aggressive tree killers. This class will cover basic bark beetle damage, identification, and management techniques.

**How to get to UCC**  
 Easy I-5 access. Take exit 129. If coming from the south, turn left at the stop light, and right onto Umpqua College Road. If coming from the north, turn left at the stop sign, and left at the next stop sign, turn right, less than a quarter mile, at Umpqua College Road. Umpqua Community College is about two miles down the road.

**Parking**

If you currently have a pond and are looking for some pointers on maintenance and enhancement or are trying to determine whether a pond is feasible, this is the class for you.

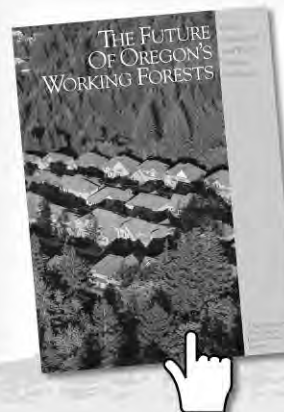
