I have a lot of exciting news from the Plant Clinic.

Our Diagnostics Class has been meeting monthly, and this last month we did an assessment of the Plant Clinic and our training program.

As an outgrowth of this meeting, we have completely revamped the training program for the new students. We will have a core of 5 teachers who will be with the students throughout their training. We also have a training outline that the instructors will be following. Each student will have a corresponding checklist. This checklist will allow both the student and the teacher to track their progress, and we can be sure all of the points are covered with every student.

As you know; all of the training cannot be completed in just two sessions. It will continue through out the 36 hours of payback time and beyond. Once the first two sessions have been completed by all of the students we will open the veteran slots up to the whole membership. At that point it will become the responsibility of **all Veterans** to continue the training. Anyone interested in working in the Plant Clinic please pick up a copy of the Office Protocol and our Training outline. When you have students working in the Clinic you will be able to

pull their checklist and see what has been covered. By following the Office Protocol and the Training Outline, all of our students will receive the same information and the same level of training. The extra copies of the Office Protocol and Training Outline are on the shelf on the back wall where we keep the signup for Brosi's and Kruse. The Student Checklists are being kept in the blue accordion folder in the bottom left had drawer of the desk.

In February we are open on Monday and Wednesday only. This limits our training days, so Karolyn Riecks and I have volunteered to come in on Thursdays and Fridays. In March, we are open on Monday, Wednesday and Fridays, and Karolyn will come in on Thursday. These extra days will be training days, as we are not officially open. We will be taking any calls and clients that come in, answering emails and phone messages and performing all the duties that we would on any other day. We are very excited about this program and look forward to your participation.

For those of us who are “Book People”, this next concept is going to be a bit difficult to grasp. Many of the wonderful seed catalogs that occupy our reading time in the cold months while waiting for good gardening weather come in an electronic version as well! Not as cozy or familiar as a paper catalog, but often more content. Save paper, get current gardening information and tutorials, and dream big for garden season 2011.

In lots of cases, actually going to a nursery to purchase seed or plants specific to our garden plan isn't very practical. There are several local seed and plant purveyors that “make home visits” via the Internet, assuring us that the seed and plants we purchase are suitable for our area. Some not-so-close merchants have good quality stock and reasonable growing

guarantees as well. One of the best reasons to look online for seed and plants is the currency of the inventory. It is frustrating to order from a source only to discover (at a later time) that the item is sold out for this season, or that the items are back-ordered, and the planting season for our area has passed by the time the seeds arrive.

2011 Budget

Toni Rudolph, Treasurer

On January 12, 2011, the Executive Board and several Committee Chairpersons met to revamp the 2011 budget. Originally the budget had us potentially spending \$19,648 more than we would make. With the cooperation of those attending the meeting, we were able to make workable adjustments to reduce the deficit to \$4,946.

Committee Chairpersons are responsible for keeping their costs within the new budgeted amount for their area of responsibility. As needs change, they will bring their requests to the Executive Board for consideration.

In order to make this work, each Committee Chairperson will need to hold all invoices and submit them after the Plant Sale on May 7. Remember: items charged at the CO-OP must be paid for upon receipt of the invoice – so if possible, delay those purchases.

Currently, the only funds that are approved to be spent prior to May 7 are specific items related to the Plant and Trash-to-Treasurers Sales. I am sure there will be additional needs that cannot wait. As you become aware of those, please contact Toni Rudolph to see if funds exist to cover those budgeted costs.

When the 2012 budget is developed, the goal will be to have a balanced budget.

I want to thank everyone who participated in the Budgeting process. The Budget is a better document because of all the time and energy you all put into it. THANKS!
