Required Upcoming Fair Registration

Spring Fair Registration | | May 17, 2017 | | 4:00 p.m.—7:00 p.m. | | Extension Auditorium

This is required to show at spring fair. You must submit your fair entry form (which can be found on the Jackson County 4-H website under “Forms” or at the Extension Office) along with your science records for any spring fair animals.

Summer Fair Registration | | June 20, 2017 | | 2:00 p.m.—7:00 p.m. | | Extension Auditorium

Similar to the spring fair registration, this registration is required to compete in any projects or contests at the summer fair. The fair registration form is the same form used for spring fair. You are also required to submit project records. For those unable to make it into the office, we will have an exciting new way to enroll! For more information, stay up to date on your Monday Morning Minute over the next few weeks.



New Leader Enrollment Deadline

In order for us to maintain better records of who is working with our youth and who will be able to receive a wristband at fair, we have put in place a new leader enrollment deadline. To receive a wristband at fair, leaders must be enrolled on 4hOnline by **April 30, 2017**.

Your Chance To Be A “Test Pilot Pioneer”

We have an exciting opportunity for a few clubs to try online fair enrollment, document uploads and payment all without having to come to the Extension office for registration day. Many counties in Oregon have been doing this process for years and the feedback is astoundingly positive. Since this will be our first year trying this, we are requiring that interested clubs contact Kim Skomerza at Kimberly.skomerza@oregonstate.edu and she will give you details on how you, as the club leader, can enter your club members or instruct them how to enter online.

Project News—Animal Science

Weigh-in times:

Weigh-in is required for market animals to show at fair. Once you weigh your animal, the animal cannot leave the fairgrounds until they are sold (the scales are located between the Barker and Krouse Barns at the Expo). **There will be no weighing back-up animals this year. The animal you weigh is the animal you show, whether or not they make weight.** If your animal does not weigh-in between the designated weight ranges (hogs: 230 lbs-280 lbs; lambs: 110 lbs-150 lbs; goats: 65+ lbs; cattle: 1,000+ lbs with a 1.5+ lbs gain per day since field day), you will be able to show in showmanship and a feeder market class. You will not be able to sell your animal in the auction; you are responsible for finding a buyer for your animal after fair. You cannot haul out your animal until the designated haul-out times. The weigh-in times are as follows (all weigh-in times are final and will not be extended or changed for any member):

Lambs: June 2, 2017, 2:30 p.m.-5:30 p.m.

Hogs: July 10, 2017, 8 a.m.-12 p.m.

Steers: July 12, 2017, 7:00 a.m.-10:00 a.m.

Goats: July 12. 2-17, 11:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m.

Animal Science Continued

Haul In/Out Times:

Market animals will haul-in to fair during their weigh-in hours. If the scales close at noon, please do not haul-in at 11:45 am as it can take time to get your animal from your trailer to its pen to the scales. Bring in your trailers through Gate 5 at the Jackson County Expo and follow instructions from there to get your animals where they need to be. For specific haul-in times, please see the Exhibitor Handbook.

If you do not make weight or you receive a white ribbon (**reminder:** white ribbon animals are not eligible to sell in the auction; you are responsible for finding your own buyer at the designated release times), you are responsible for hauling your animal off the Expo fairgrounds. For specific haul-out times for open and 4-H animals, please see the Exhibitor Handbook. If you are showing in open, you are still required to abide by 4-H haul-out times. Herdsmanship

Reminder: If you have a barn space, your club will be judged on herdsmanship throughout fair week. Herdsmanship is meant to help us make sure 4-H is reflecting a good image to the public walking through the barns. To get a good herdsmanship score, keep your area clean and picked up (animal feces removed from pens, fresh bedding, clean food pans, organized tack area, no trash sitting around, aisles kept clean and not cluttered, etc.).




Buyers' BBQ and Entry Tickets

Before each auction, a BBQ is held meant to thank individuals and businesses who bought animals the previous year. Every year, a letter with 2 BBQ and fair entry tickets are sent to buyers from the past year; however, we do have a number of BBQ and fair entry tickets available for potential buyers. If you know someone interested in being a buyer, ask them to contact you with their full mailing address. You will then contact the Extension Center 7 days before the auction with this address so we can send them tickets. You are limited to 5 new buyers per member.

Buyers' and Thank You Letters

If you are selling a market animal, we highly recommend writing buyers' letters prior to fair. For more information on an upcoming seminar on marketing your animals, see page 7. **Thank you letters are required to receive your check.** Checks become available roughly a day after the auction at the 4-H/FFA office at the Expo (near the Barker Barn) for hogs, beef, and goats. Checks for lambs will be available at the Extension Center following the auction. Thank you letters should be at least a page, hand-written, and sincere (remember, you are selling your animal for significantly more than they are worth, and your buyer still bought it). Bring it to the office in an unsealed, addressed, and stamped envelope to be reviewed in order to receive your check.



Dog Rally at Spring Fair

Dog Rally | | June 4, 2017 | | Times TBA | | Jackson County Expo

Rally consists of thirteen different stations with maneuvers the handler and dog must work through together. There is a timed element to the competition, but this will only seriously come into play if there is a tie. Since this is our first year offering Rally, it will only be allowed at the Novice level, which means all components must be done on-lead. For more information, talk to your dog leaders.

Project Notes For Fair



Horticulture

Horticulture projects this year will be required to fill out an explanation form to compete at fair. You can pick up these forms at the Southern Oregon Research and Extension Center and bring them in with your plant on July 8, 2017, to be judged during the static exhibit judging.

Videography

Are you interested in a free, basic class about filmmaking? Did you know that you can enter your videos in a competition even if you're not in a film-making club? Sign up for our June 10, 10am-noon class and try out your film-making skills. You will need to bring a cell phone that you can use for videotaping (camcorders are okay, too) and an idea for your film. **Please RSVP by May 26.** We need at least six people for the class. If you have already made a film that you would like to enter into the fair, you can get help with that entry at fair registration (see page 2). RSVP to Sara Shelton at sara.shelton@oregonstate.edu.

What is Piggybacking?

What is it? It's entering things you've made or done into the fair, even if you're not in a club for that skill.* As long as you're in a club of some kind, you are eligible to enter our contests (see the January-March edition of the Fourthoughts for a comprehensive list of contests). Besides the contests, you can also enter all sorts of projects from bug collections to photography to knitting to examples of things you've done on the computer (art, posters, spread sheets, etc.) and more! It's fun to take your very best art work from the school year and enter it in the fair. Who knows, your entry could go end up at State Fair! If you would like to enter items into the fair and aren't quite sure how to do it, bring your item and come to registration day on June 20 and we'll help you.

* Hogs, steers, lambs, goats, horses, LEGO Robotics, and shooting sports cannot be piggybacked.

Display Your Club's Activities With a New Contest!

We have a new contest between clubs. This involves creating an education board on a 20X 30 inch foam core board that tells the viewer what your club does. Make it fun and interesting, creative and dimensional, use pictures, items, and explanations. This fun competition has a \$75 prize for the winning club and a few more prizes for runners up. Can't Make Face-to-Face Judging for Static Exhibits?

If you are competing with a static exhibit (photography, sewing, horticulture, etc.) which will be entered on July 8, 2017 at the Padgham Pavilion at the Expo and you are unable to be there in person to talk to the judge, you must fill out an explanation form. These can be picked up at the Extension Center or you can find them on our website.

If you are exhibiting at fair with a VIP parking pass, you can drive back to the barns until 9:30 a.m. to bring in ice chests and equipment. After 9:30 a.m., you must be parked in the sandlot. Vehicles with the wrong parking pass will be towed.

What is a Cloverbud?

A Cloverbud is a member in 4-H who is too young to be a competing member. Cloverbuds are between the ages of 5 and 8 years old as of last September 1. The 4-H year takes place from October 1—September 30, i.e. this 4-H year is October 1, 2016—September 30, 2017. As this 4-H year began in 2016, a member must be 9 years old by September 1, 2016, to be a traditional, competing 4-H member. If a member was between the ages of 5 and 8 on September 1, 2016, then they can be a Cloverbud! While Cloverbuds are not allowed to handle large animals (including dogs), receive premiums, or compete, they can still participate in 4-H in other ways. Being a Cloverbud allows members to exhibit sewing, photography, and more, while also gaining exposure to 4-H. It is a perfect time to get excited to be a competing member in the future!

Archery Fair | | May 6, 2017 | | 8:00 a.m. check-in | | Medford Rifle and Pistol Club

Participation requires membership in an active 4-H archery club.

Smallbore Rifle/Pistol Fair | | May 7, 2017 | | 9:30 a.m. check-in | | Jackson County Sports Park Range #7

There is a \$5 entry fee to cover event costs and a \$2 charge per class. Rifle classes include stock-open sights, sporter, and precision. Pistol classes include stock and modified. There will be a champion and reserve champion in each class and a shoot-out for over-all grand and reserve grand champions in rifle and pistol. Members can shoot in multiple classes but must be enrolled in a 4-H club for that discipline. For rules talk to your club leaders.

Shotgun Fair | | May 13, 2017 | | 9:30 a.m. check-in | | Medford Gun Club on Vilas Road

In order to participate, you must be a member of an active 4-H shotgun club and have a hunter education/safety card.

Creative Writing Contest



Dress Up For This Upcoming 4-H Year

During the county fair and throughout the 4-H year, all 4-H members, volunteers, and parents will find a variety of opportunities to represent 4-H. Whether you are fundraising, interviewing, doing community service or some other 4-H activity your dress is expected to be appropriate. "Appropriate attire" always brings with it a diverse definition depending on whose definition you are using. Whether you are a youth or an adult, parent or volunteer, if you are representing yourself at a 4-H event or representing 4-H at a community event, **please use the following guidelines...**

Best is:

Clean jeans/slacks/skirt/dress (depending on the venue)

Clean and pressed shirt/blouse. 4-H club shirts are often a good choice.

Clean shoes or boots.

Clothing free of rips, holes and tears (even if it is the fashion of the times).

Body parts and undergarments...

Ladies: Underwear or bra straps should be covered.

Gentlemen: Underwear should be covered.

Tank tops must have wide straps, with arm holes and a neckline where we cannot see your chest. Camisoles or spaghetti strap tops are not tank tops. Shirts must be long enough to cover the whole body; no belly button view.

Shorts should be roughly mid-thigh in length. Long enough to cover your rear end when you are feeding, bending to pick up trash, or sleeping on a hay bale.

There will be no advertising or inappropriate sayings on any clothing; i.e. clothing must be free of: alcohol or

tobacco advertisements, bad words, implied bad language, or language that does not depict our mission or message. For example: A youth wearing "Second place is just a first place loser" on a t-shirt would be asked to change. Please help youth choose clothing that is considerate to others.

Recommended youth show ring dress: clean and neat apparel, shirt with sleeves, boots or shoes, and a visible exhibitor's number. Sleeveless shirts would button up, have a collar, and arm holes that do not reveal undergarments or your chest. No baseball caps or sunglasses will be allowed in the show ring. Please ask a project leader for animal specific show dress guidelines.

For safety in the barn, shoes are to be closed, solid toed, and hard soled. No flip flops.

Youth who are not "making the best better" may be asked to change into a more appropriate attire. We encourage everyone to wear clothes that are long enough and fit well enough to cover your top, belly, and bottom regardless if you're sitting, standing, leaning, or sleeping in the sawdust on your animal. Thanks!

Local Scholarships Available

Local Scholarships Deadline || May 1, 2017 || 4:30 p.m. || Extension Center

Jackson County 4-H offers three local scholarships to its graduating seniors, and you just might be eligible!

4-H Leaders' Association Scholarship: Award number and amount not set. Requires attendance at any accredited institution and three years in 4-H. Turn in application and record book.

Dennis Nevin Memorial 4-H Scholarship: Number of and amount (at least \$500) of scholarships awarded depend on quality of applications. Requires attendance at an accredited institution. Fill out application and sufficiently explain current 4-H involvement.

Mike Dode Memorial Scholarship: One award of \$500. Requires attendance at an accredited institution and minimum of a 2.0 GPA. Applicant must have at least one year of experience in the 4-H beef project (can now be participating in FFA, but must have 4-H beef experience). Submit application and a short essay (minimum 100 words) on what 4-H has meant to the applicant.

All scholarships are due to SOREC by May 1, 2017.


Get Pre-Registered For State Fair!

In October, we sent our Jackson County Horse Evaluation Team to nationals, and now Jackson County does it again! Justin McKechnie is a senior in high school and in the 4-H program. He has competed in shooting sports, specifically compound archery, for nine years. This year, he was the state champion in compound archery and will be heading back on the Oregon State Nationals Team in June to Grand Island, Nebraska, to compete in the national contest and represent the state of Oregon. Along with being an archer, Justin is a dedicated student who has maintained a GPA of 3.97 while also being a member of the National Honor Society and completing over one-hundred hours of community service. Additionally, he has several county archery championships to his name and was an alternate on the Oregon State 4-H Archery Nationals Team last year.



Because Justin was the state champion, his coach, Brandon Crowl, was selected to be the Nationals Team's coach as well. While this is an exciting opportunity for both of them, this does mean they are fundraising to send *both* of them to the national contest. Expanding Belonging for 4-H Youth and Volunteers

Today we find a far richer mixture of family backgrounds, ethnic heritages, and physical and mental abilities in our 4-H membership than ever before. This mixture sometimes presents challenges for volunteer leaders and members alike as they learn to function successfully in this larger picture. But what a terrific opportunity we have to blend our talents into positive outcomes. For example, youth with disabilities ARE able to participate in a variety of 4-H opportunities. Jackson County currently has a disabled member with cerebral palsy who is attending Central Point 4-H Club meetings and watching her younger sister care for their two sheep. In addition to some age developmental restrictions, the abilities of the child,




environmental circumstances, and resources of the family are factors that help guide the selection of an appropriate 4-H project for a child. Some children have disabilities that limits their capabilities of showing market animals in the county Fair according to the Fair book rules as written. In these circumstances, an accommodation plan must be developed between the 4-H Educator, 4-H'er, and their family several months prior to the 4-H event. A reasonable plan will not compromise the standards of the 4-H program, but expand access and reduce some of the physical barriers. There are no broad based rules that apply to every accommodation, and each 4-H event has unique requirements. The 4-H'er is evaluated by the educator and a written educational plan will be followed based on ability and age level.

No one has yet come up with a sure-fire recipe for success in inclusive programming; however, there are some key ingredients in the base of every good mix: Positive attitude, Clear and consistent expectations, Everybody counts, and Adaptation is acceptable - "That's the way we've always done it" is out. "Let's see how we can do this to make it work" is in. Emma Ellis is working toward improving her communication and social skills through the sheep project. Go Emma!


