This presentation will include an overview of our local Klamath-Siskiyou Mountains' historical Native American land and resource management practices. How the tribal traditional knowledge can inform modern Agroforestry management. Examples will be provided for landowners and resource managers to consider tribal stewardship of food and basketry resources, integrated with hazardous fuels reduction, and prescribed fire projects that can be beneficial to wildlife and address a range of human resource issues.
