Be a 4-H ADULT VOLUNTEER


Volunteers are the cornerstone of the 4-H program.

WHAT IS 4-H?

4-H stands for Head, Hands, Heart and Health. Green and white are the official 4-H colors.

4-H is a program primarily for 4th-12th graders.

4-H is a cooperative program of the United States Department of Agriculture, Oregon State University and Jackson County.

What is now 4-H began at the start of the 20th century. Officially it began with the passage of the Smith-Lever Act of 1914 which established the Extension Service (an extension of the land-grant universities), of which 4-H is a part.

All 4-H members gain confidence, positive self concept, appreciate social and cultural diversity, love for learning, make new friends and have fun.

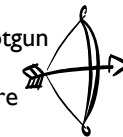

HOW TO ENROLL IN 4-H

1. New enrollments are accepted from October 1—March 15. Early bird registration by January 31. Most clubs begin in October and have activities throughout the year.
2. Pick a project: 4th—12th grade youth first determine a project that interests them. Project selection helps in locating a club.
3. Contact the Extension Office for a list of clubs and leaders currently active in your location and area of project interest.
4. To learn more about a club, call the leader. Arrange a club visit.
5. Enrollment forms are available at the Extension Office, through your leader, and on-line. Affordable County and State fees apply.
6. Clubs are led by adult volunteers. Without willing adults, we don't have clubs. Placement in a club is not guaranteed. There are project areas and communities in which there are no clubs. Some clubs reach capacity early.
