****Note:** All chapters are required to put away panels and stalls. Chapters in violation will be fined \$50 to pay the clean up crew. Checks will be distributed after fines are paid.

RULES GOVERNING FFA EXHIBITS

1. All exhibitors in the FFA Division shall be active FFA members, enrolled in all-day courses in agricultural science or be a graduate of such a course who has kept their membership paid in full since graduation. State policy on contests will be followed.

2. All exhibits must be certified by the local agricultural science instructor to be a part of the student's supervised agriculture experience project and shall have been a part of the member's project for 60 days prior to the show. Animals sold at Tygh Valley Show are not eligible to show or sell at EOLS. Beginners are freshmen or sophomores in their first year of high school agriscience class or 7th & 8th grade students enrolled in agriscience class. All others are considered advanced.

3. One member's livestock may not be shown under the name of another member, and each exhibitor shall be present to show his own stock.

4. All animals must be properly fitted each day of the show. A penalty may be deducted from premiums for uncared for exhibits. All animals must be clean when exhibited or sold.

5. All exhibits must be in place by 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday evening preceding the show.

6. An unmanageable animal may be requested to leave the show. Safety is our utmost concern. For questionable beef animals, the owner will be required to lead their animals a prescribed distance. Any control decisions will be made by the division superintendent, an EOLS officer and respective 4-H or FFA director. Any excused animal is disqualified from the sale.

7. In breeding classes, all males must be eligible for registration in the name of the exhibitor. All females must conform to and be shown in breed classes, except for crossbred classes.

8. All animals will be arranged by chapters unless otherwise specified by the FFA superintendent.

9. A pre-registration form will be sent out to all chapters and should be returned to the FFA superintendent prior to May 15th.

10. Exhibitors will be barred from exhibiting, entering contest and receiving premium money if their instructors are not present or fail to do the tasks assigned by the FFA superintendents.

11. All exhibitors must enter one showmanship and all portions of the livestock judging contest. All fitting in the showmanship contest must be done by students.

12. Special classes not listed will be arranged by the FFA area superintendents.

13. Each chapter is responsible for the actions of its members while at the Stockshow. Chapter advisors may request that exhibitors be sent home for misconduct. Animals of those guilty of misconduct will not show or sell or receive any money at the Stockshow.

14. An animal can only be shown in one class, except for foundation or herd classes.

15. Each exhibitor will furnish his own feed. Bedding will be furnished.

16. There will be no breeding classes for swine.

17. All sheep entered in breeding classes must be fitted for show. The market classes must be shown and fitted for show; maximum fleece length will be 3/8" and is to be checked at weigh-in time.

18. All males in foundation classes shall be of breeding age and not related to any female in the same group.

19. Each exhibitor will be expected to keep his livestock and stalls clean during the show and especially while showing. A dirty animal will not be judged. Stalls must be left clean. Panels must be returned. A \$5 fee may be assessed to pay someone to do this for you, if you fail to comply, this fee will need to be paid prior to your receiving your auction check.

20. Please check for additional rules listed in the back of the premium book.

21. See rules for Pollette Award, Western States Angus Awards, Union County Cattlewomen, Oregon Simmental Association, D & B, and Jody Schubert Awards listed in the special awards section of premium book.

22. Oil and/or powder may not be used on Market Hogs. This is a state rule requested by packers. Market animals fitted in this manner must be disqualified from show and sale.

23. Swine exhibitors must help mark and move their own animals to the sale ring at 7:00 a.m. on Saturday (refer to rule No. 10). You must be there to see that your animal is marked and ready.

24. All judges decisions are final. Un-sportsmanlike conduct will not be tolerated. Formal written complaints may be filed with the Eastern Oregon Livestock Show Board of Directors.

25. A chapter may have one sale animal and it must be accompanied by a FFA donation animal for improving FFA grounds and show.

Division E -- Showmanship Contest

Animals to be fitted when entering the ring. All breeds competing.

All exhibitors must enter at least one showmanship contest to be eligible for premium money and awards. Graduates prior to this year are not eligible.

Official dress must be worn by showmanship contestants. Correctness of dress will be checked by showmanship superintendent just before contestant enters ring. This includes jackets, blue ties, dark pants, white shirt or blouse. Tennis shoes do not qualify as official dress.

These are state rules for official dress. Jackets will be worn unless because of weather conditions the judge rules them out. Then no jackets will be worn.

Champion of Champions competition will include only the top advanced and beginning showman in each species. If a species has less than 3 exhibitors in either advanced or beginning, then the winning showman will advance but that species will not be represented in the Champion of Champions competition.

Division F -- Judging Contest

The superintendent of Beef, Dairy, Swine, Sheep and Market classes will aid in getting judging classes. The classes will be as follows, if possible:

Holders and pens are responsibility of the division superintendent.

Division G -- Herdsmanship Contest

A Herdsmanship Contest has been set up on a chapter basis to improve the appearance of livestock exhibits, to improve the grooming and neatness of the area, and to give training in cooperative endeavor. The following is a guide in placing Herdsmanship:

- A. Cooperative effort of Members -- neat appearance; willingness to follow regulations. Number of exhibitors will be considered.
- B. Animals. Animals tied and penned for best effect; animals well cared for (kept clean at all times, plenty of bedding used); animals fed and watered regularly. Number of animals will be considered.
- C. Barns. Exhibit cards neatly arranged; equipment kept in show boxes; aisles kept free for spectators; stalls and pens kept clean and dry.

Division H -- Individual Herdsmanship Contest

First place banners will be awarded to the best individual herdsman in each FFA division. A banner for Chapter Herdsmanship will be awarded in each division. Same guidelines as in Division G will be followed.

Jody Schubert Memorial Award

The family of Jody Schubert has established a cash award of \$50.00 for a Beginning FFA member and an Intermediate 4-H Club member. The basis for selecting the award winner will be:

4-H AND FFA AUCTION SALE RULES

1. All 4-H and FFA exhibitors may sell one market animal. Sale order of 2003 auction will be hogs, steers and lambs.
 - 1a. Any animal shown in either 4-H or FFA market classes and deemed eligible for sale, MAY NOT be shown in any future market classes in any show. This is a terminal sale.
2. Market animals must be weighed between 2:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday of the show. Animals should weigh upon arrival at stockshow grounds. Owners of any animals that arrive before 2:00 p.m. must have written permission from the FFA Superintendent or 4-H Agent acknowledging the reason for early arrival and must weigh as soon as the scales open.

3. The official sale weight shall be weights upon arrival. Unless Rule #2 pertains. Only one weight permitted. The exhibitors may bring two animals (same species) to weigh in. First animal to make weight across scale is the one tagged. Second animal must leave the grounds unless a ewe lamb and entered in that class. We have identical weighing conditions between 4-H and FFA. No weighing on two scales, or later weigh in. If animal weight is in question, animal will be taken off scale, scale re-balanced, then animal reweighed immediately. That weight will stand. Prior to show, scales are checked and certified by State Weight and Measurers Division. (If there is an emergency regarding late arrival for market animals weigh in, individuals must call the 4-H or FFA superintendent to verify. Telephone number 962-6053)

4. Only animals exhibited in the regular market classes at this show may be sold through the sale.
5. There will be no decorating of sale animals.
6. All market lambs grading choice or better must be sold through the sale. All market lambs must be shorn and fitted to be eligible for sale. Steers grading prime, choice or select must sell in the Auction Sale. Market hogs grading 1 or 2 must sell in the Auction Sale.
7. Lambs grading below choice; standard steers; and utility hogs will receive a white ribbon and will not be allowed to sell.
8. The order of sale will be based upon quality (grade) and class placing. For each type of livestock the first sale will be the highest placing animal with the highest grade classification. Within each grade classification, sales will alternate between 4-H and FFA participants.
9. Market hogs must weigh between 230 and 280 lbs across the scale to sell through the Auction Sale. Market lambs must weigh between 100 and 145 lbs. across the scales. The Market steers must weigh a minimum of 1000 lbs. and there is no maximum weight.

10. All resale steers (both 4-H and FFA) will be sold on carcass and yield grade. This means that the exhibitor will be paid on carcass quality plus the premium the buyer bids above market price.

Exhibitors that sell steers to buyers of locker meat will be paid total price bid on animals using the live grade, as has been done in the past. Market steers going for resale: The seller will be charged a feed lot fee for approximately one week at estimated cost of \$12.00. This will help prevent "dark cutters."

11. All exhibitors selling market animals will be charged a 2% commission to help pay auction sale expense. Any money held over from this account will be placed on interest in a special account.
12. Animals become the property of the buyer as they are sold. The club members and the Stock Show will cooperate in loading out the animals.
13. All market steers sold at the auction must be left tied with a rope halter at least 3/8-inch in diameter. We will endeavor to return halters if they are properly identified. A \$5 penalty will be imposed on those who fail to comply with this rule.
14. No crypt orchids to show/sell in market classes of swine, beef, & sheep.
15. All steers must be dehorned and healed.
16. Change of Ownership Slips (Not transportation certificates) must accompany market steers that weigh in.

17. All animals meeting the weight limitations will be evaluated by a qualified judge who will estimate if beef will grade select, choice, or prime; if sheep will grade choice or prime; if hogs will grade US 1 or 2.

18. 4-H and FFA members will be paid within 30 days based on price over resale and value of carcass based on grade and yield minus sale charges.

19. 4-H or FFA member must be present to sell their own animal. Auction committee may allow member to receive floor price only. Any variation must be approved by the EOLS Board with written application.

20. For those 4-H and FFA members that have financed their market animals through a lending institution, market animal checks will be jointly issued when EOLS auction committee has been so advised.

21. Animal Health Policy - The Eastern Oregon Livestock Show and sale is committed to the production of safe, wholesome food products. Therefore, livestock will be disqualified if they show any evidence of the use of unapproved animal health products or the improper use of approved animal health products. Animals suspected of improper or unapproved drug usage must be tested by a licensed veterinarian prior to sale.

21a. A drug test (both blood and urinalysis) requested by anyone other than show management must pay the costs of the tests (\$300) prior to administration of the tests. If the results are positive, the money will be

refunded and the exhibitor will be liable for the expenses incurred. The rules for improper drug usage will then apply.

Any animal condemned at slaughter for improper or unapproved drug usage will

be the responsibility of the 4-H or FFA member (i.e. will not be paid). That member will be disqualified from exhibiting a market animal the following year at EOLS.

22. Extreme docking of tails for all market lambs is prohibited. A pre-selected screening committee will be in charge of determining if any lambs are in violation of extreme docking of tails. The decision of the screening committee is final.

In order to determine extreme tail docking, a non-pliable surface (like a standard credit card) is raised in a vertical plane. If such surface (or card) catches (or lifts) tail, no violation occurs. If the non-pliable surface raised in a vertical plane does not catch (lift) the tail, a violation occurs. The lamb in violation will then be disqualified from all competition and promptly removed from the grounds.

23. No thank you gifts will be allowed in the auction sale ring. Gifts may be taken to buyers after the sale with their thank you card.
