The Eastern Oregon Livestock Show will be held **June 2nd – 7th** in Union. The Horse Show is on the 2nd and 3rd and livestock weigh in will be on the 4th. The Livestock Shows are Thursday and Friday, with the auction on Saturday the 7th. **Registration deadline to the Wallowa Co. Extension Office is Monday, May 12th !!** Registration packets have been sent to Horse and Livestock clubs. Independent 4-H members should contact the Extension Office to sign up for the livestock show.

SPRING FAIR June 17-19

Presentations will be given on Tues. & Wed.

The 2003 Spring Fair will be **June 17—19, Tuesday through Thursday** at Cloverleaf Hall. Parents, grandparents, family and friends are encouraged to attend all contests and presentations. Spring Fair is a three-day educational event that provides 4-H members the opportunity to receive public recognition for their accomplishments. 4-H'ers that are enrolled by June 1st are eligible to participate in contests in the areas in which they are enrolled. Special contests are scheduled for members enrolled in Archery and Dog Obedience.

Registration deadline for all presentations and other contests is June 2nd. All forms must be turned in to the Extension Office by this date. Presentation and contest schedules will be put together and you will be notified of times.

Late Fair Registration Rule

4-H Spring Fair registration deadline is **June 2**; 4-H County Fair registration deadline is **July 16**. Any entries received after those dates will receive no premiums, no premium points, and will not be eligible for State Fair. Late entries may receive only those awards or honors determined by official judges.

OSU Summer Conference June 25—28

Enclosed is the sign-up form for the OSU Summer Conference, **June 25-28**. There have been lots of phone calls from you on this conference, so I hope there will be lots of participants. The registration deadline is **May 30th** at the Extension Office. Class sign-ups are on a first-come, first-served basis so it is very important that you select what you would like to participate in and bring in your application and the fee as soon as possible. The registration fee is \$160.

There are \$100 scholarships available for members that are interested in taking at least one full day of technology classes. These scholarship applications are due by **May 12th**; so don't put this off if you are interested!

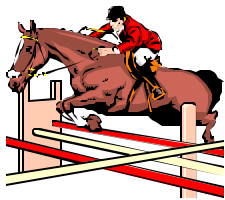
Horse Lease Forms

*A member who leases a horse must make a written agreement with the owner and submit copies of the lease to the OSU Extension office **prior to June 1** and be kept as part of the member's records.*

Pre-qualification Required to Jump

The Wallowa County Horse Leaders say 4-H members must pre-qualify before they jump at fair. Most other Oregon counties already do this to ensure that jumpers are ready to

compete safely and are at the right level.

There is one pre-qualifying day remaining at Connie Dunham's arena. **June 25** is the final date to qualify for jumping at the Wallowa County Fair. Make sure you attend either May 3rd or **June 25th** or you **will NOT** be allowed to jump at fair—NO exceptions.

There is no cost to attend but you **must** sign up for time slots at the Extension Office. Call 426-3143 to register.

State Fair Horse Change

Because of budget cuts both at the state fair and in the 4-H program, there are some big changes for state fair this year.

All Intermediates and Seniors will be attending the state fair at the same time. The warm-up arena will be used for one group and the stadium arena for the other group. The dates will be August 15, 16, 17, 18 & 19th. Members will move in on the 15th, the regular shows will be the 16th–18th and Dressage and Gaming will be on the 19th. Dressage will be in the warm-up arena and gaming will be in the stadium arena. A full schedule will be printed when all the details are available. A new warm up arena is supposed to be built for 4-H use since the other one will be used for show.

County Horse Judging Tour Results

The 2003 Annual Horse Judging Tour was held on the afternoon of April 6th. 4-H members judged 4 classes of horses and 2 classes of identification. Julie Butterfield, an Intermediate, was the overall high point judge with a score of 316, and senior, Chelcee Noland was 2nd with a score of 312. This was the first horse-judging contest of the year. Members will have the opportunity to judge again at the Eastern Oregon Livestock Show and at the Wallowa County Fair. Their scores will be compiled and the top intermediate and senior judges will qualify to represent Wallowa County at the state competition.

In the senior division (grades 10-12), Chelcee Noland placed first, and Casey Montgomery

placed second. In the intermediate division (grades 7-9), Julie Butterfield placed first, Rayanna Mitchell, second and Madeline Smith placed third. Junior division judges are horse members that are in the 4th, 5th and 6th grade. There were 11 junior members that attended this judging day. 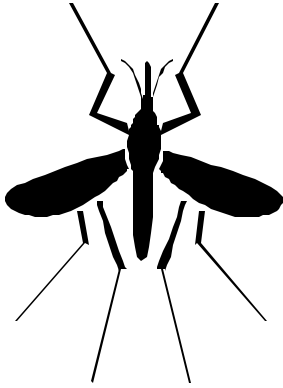

West Nile Virus



The West Nile Virus that has caused both animal and human deaths in other parts of the country is moving across the western U.S. with surprising speed and should arrive in Oregon this year. Officials in the OSU College of Veterinary Medicine are recommending that all horse owners in Oregon have their horses or other equines vaccinated for the disease—it poses a special risk to horses and that is the only animal species for which an effective vaccine exists.

Birds are the natural host of the virus, but it can also infect horses and, to a much lesser extent, humans. It is transmitted by many species of mosquitoes, include some of those found in Oregon. Most people who become infected do not even become ill, but it can cause fever, headache, other aches and pains, and in severe cases encephalitis, meningitis and death. The most severe cases are usually found in people with a weakened immune system. There is no specific treatment for human illness, or a vaccine.

To receive protection, your horse needs the initial vaccination followed by a second shot approximately 2 weeks later. Protection for the horse occurs about two weeks following the last shot. Since the vaccination process takes a minimum of two weeks, it is being recommended that vaccinations begin at least a month before mosquito season. So now is the time to begin. Contact your veterinarian for the proper procedures.

Livestock Judging Tour Results

The annual 4-H Livestock Judging Tour was held Saturday, March 29th with 10 4-H members and 5 adults participating. The tour began at Perry and Donna Mae Johnston's Ranch after an orientation at Cloverleaf Hall. The members judged 2 classes of beef, then moved on to Debbie and Tim Gilbert's home where they evaluated one swine class and 3 classes of sheep. 4-H members judged four animals in each class, answered questions about the animals and had an opportunity to give oral reasons for one classes.

High scoring Junior members (grades 4-6) were: Clancy Warnock, 248; Sarah Butterfield, 259; Jaymes Butterfield, 256; and Kyle Stangel, 240. High scoring Intermediate members (grades 7-9) were: Katrina Anderson, 298; Krista Stangel, 293; Tricia Kunkle, 290; KC Kunkle, 288; Lucas Stangel, 278; and Rayanna Mitchell, 276. Overall, Katrina Anderson was the high point judge, with Krista Stangel second and Tricia Kunkle placing third.

The Spring Judging Tour is the first judging competition of the year. Members will be able to test their judging skills at the Eastern Oregon Livestock Show in June and the Wallowa County Fair in August. The best intermediate and senior judges will then judge at the Oregon State Fair in September.

The day was beautiful, the 4-H members, parents and leaders enjoyed the day and worked up a big appetite for the BBQ, sponsored by Gilbert Trucking.

Wool can be donated to 4-H

If you are not donating your wool, you are responsible for getting your own wool to Island City on the day the wool buyer accepts wool.

Lamb Weigh In, Shear Day, May 24th



The lamb weigh-in for fair market lambs will be **May 24th from 8:00 a.m. – 12:00 noon** at the fairgrounds in Enterprise. Lambs need to weigh 110-150 pounds for county fair. We will also be having Shear Day on this date. It will cost approximately \$4.00 to have your lamb sheared.

If there are small flocks needing to be sheared, they should come in the afternoon after market animals have been shorn.

Poultry Judging Contest at Spring Fair Thursday, June 19th

Alert to all domestic poultry owners: Exotic Newcastle Disease

The Poultry Judging Contest will be offered again this year at Spring Fair.

Members must pre-register on the Spring Fair Registration Form. If less than 10 members register, the contest will be canceled.

This contest is a great learning opportunity for poultry members, foods members and livestock members. It will be held Thursday, June 19th at 2:00 pm.

The disease has been found in Nevada and Southern California. It is a viral disease that affects all birds. No human health concerns have been reported. There is no cure and exposed or affected birds are destroyed. Prevention is the best method of control. To help prevent the spread of this disease you must not accept birds from a quarantined area. Do limit visitors and exposure of your flock. Call 503-986-4680 before shipping in any birds. Get a health certificate within 24 hours of bringing in any birds from other areas. Do not buy or visit any illegal birds. This disease can come in on your clothing, shoes, equipment, and anything else that has contact with your birds. Use sanitation and disinfectants to keep your facility clean. Signs of the disease are as follows: birds coughing, sneezing, and/or diarrhea, and/or depression, twisted neck, and dragging wings or legs. It is very contagious and can be spread by live and dead birds as well as by contamination. There is no cure the disease will kill an infected flock. If you suspect anything call the State Veterinarian at 503-986-4680.

- In Class 7, Grades 10-12, Michelle Phillips placed 10th and had a score of 196 and

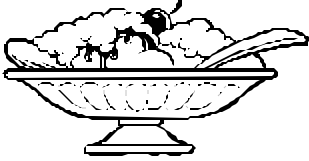


Relissa Wortman had a score of 164.

4-H Enrollment Deadline June 1st

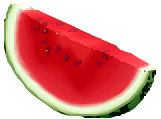

Spring Fair competitions open to all 4-H members:

Presentations—Competition will be all day Tuesday & Wednesday, June 17th & 18th.

1. 4-H presentations will include demonstrations and illustrated talks--any oral presentation that uses visuals (models, charts, pictures, slides or the actual materials) to present information.
2. Teams will consist of two members. If the 4-H'ers are in different age groups, they will be judged in the older age group. If one of the members is a junior, the team **CANNOT** be selected for State Fair competition.
3. Topic of presentation may be anything the member wants to share with others.
4. Each team or individual will be allowed 30 minutes to set up, present and clear the area and must be done by the 4-H member(s). The actual presentation should be between 3—10 minutes for Juniors and 10 to 20 minutes for intermediates and seniors.
5. A 4-H member may not present the same topic more than once at either the county or State Fair contest.
A 4-H member may enter only one presentation in any one year (exception: Beef Ambassador).

Favorite Food Contest[Pre-registration required] **Contest is held Wednesday, June 18th.** This contest asks 4-

H members to display their favorite food set for an occasion or holiday. Some ideas may be: “western BBQ”, “4th of July”, “Baby Shower.” You will have plenty of time to arrange the table setting display, but it must be the work of the member. Each contestant will prepare a display consisting of: 1. A menu printed on a 3 x 5 card (menu must contain a favorite food) 2. A table set for one, complete with cloth and centerpiece. (Bring your own card table). 3. Recipe of the favorite food printed or typed on a 3 x 5 card. 4. Bring Favorite Food to serve Judge. You will take home remainder of food after being judged. There are facilities to keep food hot or refrigerated. Your table will be set up in the large room and left until the end of the awards ceremony. I think they will be really fun for the awards program!

Favorite Outfit Contest **Favorite Outfit Boards can be worked on all day Tuesday & Wednesday, June 17th and 18th.** This contest asks 4-H members to display their favorite outfit and accessories around your own theme.

After everyone's is set up a judge will go around and judge each display — no interview. You will have plenty of time to arrange the display but it must be the work of the member. Boards will be provided for you. You will need to cover board with paper or fabric as you begin. Boards will be 4' x 4' and are easy to push pins into. Bring clear plastic to cover finished board. They will stay up until after the awards program. The garment may be for any age person; may be formal or informal; purchased or made at home. An explanation sheet obtained from the 4-H office must accompany the exhibit.
