4-H & FFA GENERAL RULES

1. All 4-H and FFA club members will make entries on blanks issued by the County Extension Office. 4-H and FFA Fair Entries are due no later than **July 31, 2024**. No late entries accepted.
2. A 4-H member may enter only one exhibit per class unless otherwise specified.
3. All boys and girls properly enrolled in 4-H or FFA in Sherman County for the 2024 club year are eligible for premiums offered for projects in which they are enrolled.
4. **Classes for all 4-H contestants and exhibitors are based on their age on September 1, 2023 for the current 4-H program year. Junior – 9-11 years old...Intermediate – 12-14 years old, Senior – 15-19 years old.**
5. FFA members will fit in the class that is appropriate for their age level during the current year.
6. A detailed schedule of 4-H and FFA Fair activities is in the front of this book.
7. If a 4-H or FFA member plans to exhibit in any fair or similar exhibition, the product exhibited must be the result of work done by the member specifically for the purpose.
8. 4-H'ers in Home Ec projects receiving class champion ribbons must exhibit in the next class or an advanced phase the next year.
9. If school is in session, no 4-H or FFA member will be given an excuse from school by the County Extension Office.
10. **The judge's decision is the FINAL decision.**
11. 4-H and FFA members are expected to do their own work.
12. Exhibits are housed at Fairgrounds at the exhibitors own risk.
13. Qualifying events will be held for those wishing to compete at Oregon State Fair.

4-H/FFA Animal Exhibits & Contests

1. All club members are required to do their own work.
2. All beef animal exhibits must have been carried in a 4-H or FFA project by the club member since April 7, 2024 (official ownership tagging date). Market swine, sheep, and goats must be secured by June 2, 2024. Members must ride, show or exhibit horses they have owned or leased and trained for 90 days prior to the county and State fair. All market animals must be tagged and designated into which club the animal will be shown at the Sherman County Fair on the official date annually set by the Sherman County Youth Livestock Auction. **NO STEERS WITHOUT HALTERS WILL BE TAGGED.**
3. Registered animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor. (Registration in a partnership or family name is acceptable providing that the 4-H or FFA member's animals have been designated at the beginning of the project. All 4-H/FFA animals are required to supply a Country of Origin Affidavit/Declaration Statement.
4. Owners of cattle must provide transportation certificates. Sellers of branded steers must provide the Sherman County Youth Livestock Auction with transportation certificates and bills of sale from the original owner.
5. Club members are limited to 2 market animals per species to exhibit and sell. 4-H and FFA market and breeding livestock projects will not be allowed to enter open class.
6. No horns will be allowed. Animals must be polled or dehorned. Regrowth is undesirable but will be permitted up to one inch. They must be fully healed before being stalled at the county fair. Make sure all male animals are fully castrated by the tagging date.

7. Class divisions will be made at the discretion of 4-H Association, FFA Advisor and superintendents but must adhere to the rules and regulations.
8. All 4-H and FFA animals shall be available for the livestock judging clinic, judging contest and overall showman contest.
9. An auction of market animals meeting specifications outlined in these guidelines will be held at the Sherman County Fair on Saturday. The livestock auction is conducted by the Sherman County Youth Livestock Auction.
10. The barn superintendent or a fair board representative must be present when any medicine and/or medical treatment is administered to any 4-H or FFA animal during the period when these animals are on the fairgrounds during the fair. Failure to comply with this rule will automatically disqualify the participant from any and all 4-H and FFA events. If vet tests prove the animal has been given medicine illegally, the 4-H'er or FFA'er will be liable for any vet costs.
11. For 4-H and FFA members to qualify for any premiums and awards for contests and classes:
12. **MARKET STEERS**-- must weigh 1000 lbs & up. **MINI STEERS**--must weigh 700lbs & up with a maximum hip height of 48" **MARKET LAMBS** -- must weigh 110-175 lbs. **MARKET HOGS** -- must weigh 225-300 lbs **MARKET GOATS** – 60 lb. minimum weight. **TURKEYS** – 16-36 lbs. and less than 25 weeks of age. **RABBITS** 5.5lbs-9lbs. Official weigh-in of all market animals will be held Wednesday, times are as follows...Market beef 10 and 11am, turkeys 11am-11:30am, 11:30am-12pm Lunch break for Scale operator, swine 12pm-2pm, sheep and goats 2-3pm. At the time of the weigh-in the exhibitor's project will be weighed in and the official exhibit weight given to the exhibitor at that time. At this point the exhibitor may challenge the weight given and the animal removed from the scales. The scales will then immediately be zeroed, and the animal re-weighed. If the first weight is different from the second weight, the second weight will be considered the official weight. **ANIMALS THAT DO NOT MEET THE MINIMUM WEIGHT LIMITS, DO NOT MEET PACKER CRITERIA WILL NOT BE SOLD IN THE LIVESTOCK AUCTION**, although they will be permitted to participate in showmanship. NOTE: Classes within the various contests are determined by market weights and set by 4H livestock leaders and FFA advisor.
13. When a member loses an animal of any species after the date of initial tagging or weigh-in the member will not be able to replace the animal. Turkeys must be purchased by June weigh-in.
14. For 4-H and FFA members to be eligible for steer carcass contests, animals must be within the specified weight limitations, meet any age limitations established for each class of livestock. For steer carcasses to be eligible for champion carcass awards, carcasses must qualify as a carcass of merit and participate in a live market class.
15. Parents will not be allowed to help their child with their 4-H or FFA exhibit during the fair. If parents continue to disregard this rule after once being warned, the exhibit is subject to disqualification from all 4-H and FFA contests and the livestock auction. The Grievance Committee will be the deciding board as to whether the exhibit will be disqualified.
16. A 4-H and FFA horse club member must have complete control, including the responsibility for care and management of at least one horse or pony he/she can ride and handle safely, or a colt or young horse that he/she is raising and training. Effective January 1, 1996, all Oregon 4-H and FFA members participating in any equestrian activity, regardless of riding seat, will wear a properly fitted equestrian helmet which meets the standards imposed by the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) F1163 and includes certification and labeling required by the Safety Equipment Institute (SEI). Such headgear will be secured with the harness engaged and be properly fastened when mounted on an equine or in a vehicle (cart, wagon, buggy, etc.) being pulled by one or more equine. If a member borrows or leases a horse for his project, he must have a business-like written agreement with the owner. It must include such items as the length of time he is to keep the horse for his project, training, use, feeding, special care, showing and breeding. Copy of lease turned into Extension office 1 week prior to fair.
17. Horse members and attendants should be neat, clean, and dressed in hard-soled shoes or boots, long sleeved shirts and long pants. Boots are required for exhibitors in all classes. Boots must have adequate heel to prevent forward movement of boot through stirrup. The boot must be able to move freely in stirrup and able to slip out.
18. Horse equipment must be safe, clean, properly adjusted and suitable for the class in which you show. Members not meeting these standards may lose points or possibly be eliminated. Age or cost of equipment is not considered. Each member must have equipment for the specific class entered. Refer to the appropriate division in the 4-H Horse Contest Guide PNW574.
19. The 4-H or FFA horse member must use the same horse in showmanship, equitation, trail horse and ground training. Exception: A member may use a yearling or a 2-year-old in ground training, if carried as a project, or if using a different horse as their ranch horse project.
20. State Fair contestants will be approved through a tryout process.
21. In the Horse Project, two or more members of the same family can share a horse with prior approval.
22. An individual may not carry the same animal in both FFA and 4-H at the same time. At tagging a member must designate which program the animal is entered in to.
23. There will be no cross over for 4-H/FFA beef, sheep, swine and goat breeding project animals into open class.
24. A parent or guardian will sign off on the livestock entry form that their child will properly care for their fair animal(s) which means properly **watering, feeding and the cleaning of animal and its stall, and final cleanup of animal stalls at the end of the Fair**. Youth failing to do so are subject to appear before the Grievance Committee and may

be banned from selling their animals at the livestock auction and/or forfeiture of all premiums and awards received during fair if the youth does not properly take care of their animal after being warned about their improper care of their animal(s) by the Grievance Committee.

25. **The judge's decision is the FINAL decision.**
26. No 4-H or FFA animal shall be admitted or allowed to remain on the Fair premises that show any evidence of illness, infection, contagious disease or any unsightly condition. The exhibitor, parents, and leaders will meet to discuss any situation. If there is any disagreement, the 4-H Agent, a Fair Board member, the FFA Advisor, youth owner/exhibitor and the species barn superintendent shall meet to decide on health inspection, diagnostic tests, or removal from the Fairgrounds. The cost of any health inspection or diagnostic test shall be the responsibility of the owner. .
27. **All livestock exhibits (4-H & FFA and Open) will be released Sunday of Fair (time to be determined). Members must check with individual barn superintendents regarding the appropriate checkout procedure, and they must be checked out by the barn superintendent responsible for their species after cleaning.**
28. **Any disputes with these rules will be handled by The Grievance Committee-** A Grievance Committee will be made up of an Auction Committee member, a club leader, 4-H agent, fair board member, FFA advisor and species barn superintendent.

4-H & FFA Equitation

Both Western and English equitation (horsemanship) classes will be provided. Age classes and awards will be the same as for showmanship. The Oregon 4-H Horse Project Manual and the 4-H Horse Contest Guide shall be used for guides in this contest.

4-H and FFA Equitation: A member may enter both Western and English equitation at County Fair but must indicate at State Fair selection their choice of the one, as they are only allowed to enter one equitation state fair class. 4-H Exhibitors must qualify for participation in the State Fair 4-H Horse Show by earning a minimum combined qualifying score of 170 points in showmanship and their respective equitation class (English or western) at their county qualifying activity.

4-H Horse Showmanship

Spurs and bridles are not allowed. Show halters or show bridle, each complete with a throat latch are permissible for all ages. Lead chains, over or under, are permissible if properly used. Contestants may dress Western or English (See 4-H Horse Contest Guide for rules for Standard Western dress.) Whips are not allowed. In showmanship, members exhibiting in English attire may show in a breed appropriate show bridle.

4-H Exhibitors must qualify for participation in the State Fair 4-H Horse Show by earning a minimum combined qualifying score of 170 points in showmanship and their respective equitation class (English or western) at their

county qualifying activity. This score is based on a possible of 200 points, 100 for showmanship and 100 for equitation. Participants meeting this minimum score of 170 points make up what is referred to as the County Delegation.

4-H & FFA Trail Horse Contest

Open to exhibit horses or ponies. Horses will be worked individually over and through a series of obstacles. Pattern for obstacles will be given at the beginning of contest. Spurs are optional but not necessary. No ropes. The rider may show English or Western. See clothing and equipment specifications for proper tack and attire.

Trail Horse Obstacles: No less than six and no more than 10 obstacles will be used. Each obstacle has a value of 10 and is scored according to how the rider maneuvers through the entire obstacle. Thirty seconds to start per obstacle will be allowed. Complete the course with judge's individual instructions on leads. See the Horse Contest Guide for trail horse dimensions.

Any member of the county delegation who received a blue award in Trail and earned the minimum combined qualifying score in Showmanship and Equitation at the county qualifying event is eligible to participate at State Fair Trail competition.

4-H Ranch Horse Division

The 4-H Ranch Horse Program is designed to teach 4-H members how to safely handle horses and cattle. Members will learn about the health and feeding of horses and cattle and handling these animals in work situations. Members must be enrolled in the 4-H horse program by April 1st of the current year. All participants must have completed appropriate Ranch Horse steps in the "new" advancements. Juniors must have completed step 1, Intermediates must have completed steps 1 and 2, and Seniors must have completed steps 1, 2 and 3.

Ground Training

Participants may not enter equitation classes at State Fair but may enter showmanship with the ground training animal. Male colts older than 12 months must be gelded. If the qualifying ground trainers in each ground training class also qualify to come in equitation and showmanship, they may bring both the ground training and equitation animals. Contestants will give the judge, in advance, a list of exercises to be attempted, age of the member, age of the animal and length of training period. All training must be done by 4-H member who is showing the animal. Training by others, including other 4-H members, makes animals ineligible for class. Fifteen minutes will be allowed. Recognition will be made according to how well items are accomplished. Horses entered in ground training should never have been mounted by the exhibitor.

Dressage

A dressage or all-purpose hunter seat saddle is to be used. An English bridle with a plain smooth English snaffle bit is required. See the Oregon 4-H Dressage Manual for types of acceptable bits. A plain snaffle bridle and regular cavesson, flash or dropped-noseband, or figure eight, made entirely of leather or leather-like material is mandatory. Strictly forbidden, under penalty of elimination are: The mouthpiece of any bit must be made entirely of the same metal, martingales, bit guards, accessories (specifically bearing, side, running, or balancing reins, etc.), any type of boots (including "easy boots"), bandages, any form of blinkers, ear muffs or plugs, nose covers, seat covers, and hoods.

Test requirements are the same for juniors, intermediates, and seniors. Test is to be ridden and judged according to USAE rules. Tests to be used are the current approved USAE tests. Exhibitor should make sure they are using the most current test. Tests may be read, but must be limited to reading the movement, one time only, as it is written. Ride is to be judged on horse's gait, impulsion, and submission; the rider's position and seat, and the correctness and effectiveness of the aids. Each movement is scored (on 0 to 10 points) to establish whether the movement performed was insufficient (4 or below) or sufficient (5 or above). Participants must have earned the minimum combined qualifying score in showmanship and equitation and received a blue ribbon in Dressage Training Level Test 2, 3, or 4 or First Level Test 1 with a minimum score of not less than 58% at the county level to qualify. A member who scores 62% and above at the 2018 Oregon State fair must progress to the next level in 2020. The requirement to move up does not apply to a new horse.

Western Gaming

Premiums: 1st-\$5.00, 2nd-\$4.00, 3rd-\$3.00, 4th-\$2.00, 5th-10th-Ribbons

Gaming events are timed games on horseback and are individual in nature. Approved 4-H games in Oregon include flag event, figure 8 stake race, barrel and stake, key race, pole bending, keyhole, and Texas barrels. Variations are permitted, but they must be as safe or safer. 4-H contestants must ride horses they have owned, leased, and or trained at least 90 days before competition. A Western saddle with a saddle horn is required. Western-type equipment is typically used with the following exceptions: bridles must have throat latch, running martingales with rein stops, martingales, tie-downs used with breast collar, nosebands, draw reins, splint boots, bell boots, bandages, mechanical hackamores, and gag bits are permitted; whips under 36 inches, bats, quirts, crops and over/under are allowed. Reins must be one piece or knotted. Riders will be disqualified if the judge considers equipment inhumane or dangerous, or if equipment breaks and rider is unable to safely continue without repairs. Spurs, if worn must be properly used. Sherman County Fair does not offer a qualifying competition for 4-H'ers to become eligible for State Fair, however 4-H'ers have been invited to participate in other county qualifying events. Participants must earn a blue ribbon to be eligible for State fair. Sherman County Fair will run these events during the horse play-day events held at fair.

Any member with a special reason to wish to be exempt from showmanship contests must show just cause to the Grievance Committee, whose decision shall be final. Premiums may be withheld from members who fail to participate in showmanship contests without the exemption of the Grievance Committee. The member who wishes to be excused from showmanship must give ample notice. If a participant is only registered in the Ranch Horse program, that participant is not required to participate in showmanship. If an animal is unable to compete in showmanship:

1. Showman must make commitment to participate in showmanship contest.
2. Names of other exhibitors with 2 animals of same species go into a draw.
3. A name is drawn. Showman must ask permission of the other owner to show their animal.
4. Showman is responsible to clean and fit the animal drawn.
5. FFA advisor, County Agent, Barn Superintendent, together may delete specific animals from the draw for safety considerations.

Grand Champion Showmanship Contest

1. The best showman from Beef, Sheep, Goats, Swine & Horses will be in this contest. There must be five participating species. If a showman has won in two species, he/she must choose which class in which he/she wishes to participate. The Reserve Champion in the other class will then be eligible to participate for Grand Champion Showman.
2. 4-H and FFA members will be judged by a livestock and horse judge. The judges will then confer to pick the overall champion. The winner will be the Grand Champion Showman.

The 4-H and FFA Market Animal Auction Sale is sponsored and produced by the **Sherman County Youth Livestock Auction Inc.** "SCYLA" is a 501(c)3; mailing address is P.O. Box 94 in Moro, OR 97039.

1. Sale date is Saturday August 24, 2024
2. All Market Animals will need to meet the weight requirements for the specific species and be exhibited in the 4-H and FFA market classes during the Sherman County Fair to be sold through the SCYLA Sale. (underweight and/or heavy weight animal's **WILL NOT** be sold through the livestock auction)
3. Minimum and maximum weights for market animals shall be as follows:
 - Market Hogs 225-300 lbs.
 - Market Lambs 110-175 lbs.
 - Market Beef 1000 lbs. minimum (Mini/Lowline Steer 700 lb. minimum)
 - Market Goats 60 lb. minimum
 - Market Turkeys 16-36 lbs.
 - Market Rabbits 5.5-9 lbs.
4. Sale order starting in 2020 was Goats, Poultry, Swine, Sheep, & Beef. Sale order will rotate each successive year.
5. Sheep, Beef, Goats and Swine will be sold by the pound. Turkeys & Rabbits will be sold by the head.
6. All animals will arrive on Wednesday August 21, 2024 for official fair weigh in. Arrival times will be as follows;
 - BEEF** 10-11 AM (1000 lbs minimum) (Mini/Lowline Steer 700 lb. minimum)
 - TURKEYS** 11 AM -11:30 AM (16-36 lbs.) or age listed above
 - RABBITS** 11:45 AM (5.5-9 lbs.)
 - SWINE** 12-2 PM (225-300 lbs)
 - SHEEP & GOATS** 2-3 PM (sheep 110-175 lbs; goats 60 lbs minimum)
7. Market animals presented **without** ear tags or proper ID may not be exhibited at fair and will not be sold thru the auction.
8. At the time of the weigh-in the exhibitor's project will be weighed and the official exhibit weight given to the exhibitor at that time. At this point the exhibitor may challenge the weight given and the animal removed from the scales. The scales will then immediately be zeroed, and the animal re-weighed. If the first weight is different from the second weight, the second weight will be considered the official weight.
9. MARKET ANIMALS THAT DO NOT MEET THE SPECIES WEIGHT REQUIREMENTS AS LISTED ABOVE AND DO NOT MEET PACKER CRITERIA **WILL NOT** BE SOLD IN THE LIVESTOCK AUCTION, although they may/will be permitted to participate in showmanship classes.
*NOTE: Classes within the various contests are determined by market weights and set by the Extension office and the **weigh master**.
10. The order of the sale will be determined by show ring placing. Animals grading highest will sell first, with lower grades following in order, except that each exhibitor shall have a chance for one single sale before others can make a second sale of that species, regardless of grade. If exhibitor receives both Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion in the same species, they will be able to sell in that order.
11. An exhibitor may sell two single entries of each market species.
12. Consignment of livestock will be to the Sherman County Youth Livestock Auction Inc. and a deduction from the sale price of each animal will be made in lieu of any other selling charges, to offset the cost of conducting the sale.
13. Exhibitors' will be paid as soon as the SCYLA treasurer receives the funds from auction buyers.
14. If an animal is condemned in the slaughter process, it is the seller's (4-H or FFA member's) responsibility to absorb the loss.
15. Artificial coloring of any animal or any artificial means of removing or remedying physical effects of conformation in animals, such a lifting or filling under the skin will be considered fraud and deception. All animals giving evidence of such treatment before or after slaughter will result in the owner being barred from future shows and all awards and sale proceeds being withheld from current show.
16. All Exhibitors will properly take care of their animals during the week of fair. This means to provide a safe environment, proper food and clean fresh water. Exhibitors in violation may result in not being able to sell their animal or animals thru the auction.
17. All livestock exhibitors are responsible to take care of their animals following the market animal auction until **all** animals have been loaded onto the proper slaughter trucks.

All Auction Exhibitors must check with individual barn superintendents regarding the appropriate checkout procedure for their species.

Preparation of exhibit: All products must have a 4-H Food Preservation Explanation Card (512-07) that must be thoughtfully and completely filled out by the 4-H'er with ALL information, and complete instructions/recipe. Explanation Cards are available at the county Extension office or on the State 4-H website.

All containers must have a label or tape with member name, county, and class number placed on the bottom of the container, so product is visible. Dried foods must be exhibited in jars or sturdy plastic bags, with labels securely attached. Make sure to follow the approved processing times listed for your product. Be sure all jars are properly sealed and include jar rings on all canned products for safe transport. Unsealed jars will be disqualified.

For judging, use clear jars only. Regular and wide-mouth Mason-type, threaded, home-canning jars with self-sealing lids are the best choice. Jars may be opened during the judging process. We strongly urge you to use smaller jars for your fair exhibits. 94 Suggest 4 oz. jars for jams and jellies, half pints & pint jars for other products.

Larger jars will be accepted, but food may be wasted as any opened jars may be emptied before returning after fair. Tip: Bring two exhibits to the county fair, one for county fair judging (to open) and one to come to state fair (if chosen).

512 111 24() Fermented pickles or sauerkraut. One jar of fermented (brined) pickles or sauerkraut. Jars must be sealed by processing in a boiling water canner.

512 111 25() Canned vegetables or tomatoes. One jar of canned vegetables or tomatoes processed in a pressure canner.

512 111 26() Canned meat, poultry, or fish. Fish products must be exhibited in pint or half pint jars. One jar processed in a pressure canner.

512 111 20() Canned Broth. One jar of canned broth (liquid only, no meat or vegetable pieces) processed in a pressure canner.

512 111 28() Canned combination dish. One jar of canned combination dish processed in a pressure canner. Examples include chili, soup, baked beans, etc.

512 111 29() Dried meat or poultry jerky. Four @ 1-inch by 3-inch pieces of one type of jerky. Meat jerky (beef, venison, or poultry) must follow the recommendations for preparation in Making Jerky at Home Safely, PNW 632, May 2012.

Food and Nutrition

Premiums: Blue \$3.00, Red \$2.00, White \$1.00

Food and Nutrition Chair Note: Each member may enter up to three classes within the level they are in, one exhibit per class and Celebrate our World. All foods entered must be made by the exhibitor.

Exhibit ingredients:

- Exhibits must be suitable for keeping at the fair without excessive spoilage or change of appearance. Highly perishable foods are not acceptable. Highly perishable foods include, but are not limited to cream cheese, custard fillings, and meats of any type.
- Ingredients that the 4-H member cannot legally purchase, such as beer, whiskey, rum, etc. may not be used in any recipe or foods exhibit. Exhibits that include alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified. This includes menu and recipe file exhibits.
- Commercial mixes cannot be exhibited except as an ingredient in a product.

Preparation of exhibit:

- Exhibits must be displayed on a disposable plate and in a self-sealing bag.
- Exhibits must include the recipe and a menu for one meal including the food item. Recipes for food products should include all information given on the Exhibit Recipe Card (511-00) format. The recipes will not be returned to the exhibitor.
- When alternative ingredients are used, these are to be underlined on the recipe.
- Exhibits in the Celebrate our World class must also include the Celebrate our World Explanation Card (998-03)

Favorite Recipe Collection (All skill levels)

- Cards or recipes must be in front of file or designated (paper clips, tabs, etc.) throughout the collection for ease in judging.

511 300 112 Intermediate - Collection with ten (10) recipes* of foods you have prepared.

- 2 recipes must feature a source of protein,
- 2 recipes must include a variety of grain products,
- 3 need to have vegetables as the focus,
- 2 feature fruit
- 1 is free choice.

*The recipes need to include three food items appropriate for each of the basic three meals: breakfast (such as smoothies, baked items, or pancakes/waffles/toasts), lunch

(such as sandwiches, soups, and wraps) and dinner (such as casseroles, side dishes, and salads) menus. The remaining recipe is totally free choice.

511 300 113 Senior – collection with fifteen (15) recipes* of foods you have prepared.

MEAS1-Measuring Contest- *For first year indoor cooking members only.*

Follow the judge's instructions on how to correctly measure different ingredients including: flour, sugar, baking powder, water, shortening, etc.

CBC()-Cookie Baking Contest

Bake cookies in front of a judge (all ingredients and utensils should be brought from home), present your cookies to the judge along with the recipe, discuss with the judge and answer questions about the baking process, recipe, and taste/texture/appearance of cookies.

MFF()-My Favorite Food

Bring a favorite dish (made by the exhibitor at home) to share with the judge. Must bring the table setting from home and show how to properly set a table. Provide a menu to go along with your favorite food, discuss with the judge your favorite food, how it was made, your table setting, and how the menu you provided is a balanced meal.

511 700 100-Informational Poster

Make an educational poster to share with the judge about a cooking theme of your choice.

Examples: food Safety, How to make a balanced meal using MyPlate, price differences between store bought and home made goods. Be creative!

Fiber Arts

Premiums: Blue-\$3.00, Red-\$2.00, White-\$1.00

Each piece of an exhibit must be labeled on the back, inside, or bottom with the 4-H'er's name, county, and exhibit class number. If article is designed as a pair/set, both items must be labeled and fastened together, i.e. set of potholders, pillowcases, gloves, etc. Smaller items, such as bracelets, must be mounted for display

Explanation & Evaluation All entries must have a fully completed 4-H Fiber Arts Exhibit Explanation card (261-01) to qualify for judging. These forms take the place of interview judging at State Fair, so be as thoughtful and comprehensive as possible when sharing the required information. The explanation must give the 4-H'er's name, county and class number, origin of design, intended use of the item, previous experience using this technique and a description of how it was made. Judging criteria is outlined on the Fiber Arts Evaluation Sheet (261-02), or the Applique, Patchwork, and Quilting Evaluation Sheet (261-04).

261 100 76()Patchwork Quilts, no kits, Quilts of any size made using piecing techniques such as English, traditional American, Seminole, etc. Members may choose to follow a pattern, such as Log Cabin, but the fabric selection, fabric layout, and all cutting is done by the 4-H'er. If the completed item is quilted by someone other than the 4-H'er, please note this on the Fiber Arts Exhibit Explanation Card.

261 100 77()Patchwork on other items, Items other than quilts made using piecing techniques such as English, traditional American, Seminole, etc. Might include clothing, wall hangings, pillows, linens, etc

261 100 81()Quilting, machine stitched, Multi layered projects made using machine quilting stitches. Items must have a top layer, filling or batting, and bottom layer held together by machine stitching. All work done by the 4-H'er

261 100 82()Quilting, tied, Multi layered projects created by using fiber (yarn, embroidery floss, crochet thread, etc.) that is tied to hold the layers together. Items must have a top layer, filling or batting, and bottom layer held together by the tied (knotted) stitches.

Clothing and Textiles

Premiums: Blue-\$3.00, Red-\$2.00, White-\$1.00

Participants may enter up to **four** exhibits in the construction classes but **only two exhibits in any one class**.

- They may also enter one exhibit in the creativity, costumes, hands-for-larger service, and/or skills notebook.
- All exhibits must be in the same level.
- Members may not enter the same garment or accessory in an exhibit class and in the fashion revue.
- All items must be clean and in good repair.
- Hangers and/or garment bags are removed from exhibits prior to judging and might not be returned.

Sewing Exhibit Judging Criteria

Judging criteria are outlined in 4-H Clothing and Textile Construction Evaluation Sheet (320-01), the 4-H Clothing and Textile Creative Expression and Costume Evaluation Sheet (320-02), or the Skills Notebook Evaluation Sheet (320-96) which can be found at on the Oregon 4-H State website. Judging standards are listed in Measuring Up: Quality Standards for Sewn Items/Projects (PNW-197).

- Each entry will be evaluated on ALL features.
- For skill levels 1-6 the use of fabrics or skills that are beyond the recommendations for this level are expected to be done well according to the standards, but will neither be given extra credit consideration for increased difficulty nor disqualified during judging.
- It is in the best interest of the 4-H'er to stay within the suggested guidelines. See 4-H Clothing Guidelines for Leaders: Basic, Expanding and Advanced Skills (4-H 320-00L).

Identifying your Exhibit

- 4-H Exhibit tags must be attached to the exhibit.
- Each garment or article in the construction classes must be labeled with the 4-H'er's name, county, and project level.
 - This label must be typed or printed in indelible pencil or ink on a piece of white fabric and sewn or fused onto the bottom inside of each piece.
 - Exhibits that have more than one piece SHOULD be have each piece labeled and both need to be tied together or connected in some way so that the pieces can be considered as one exhibit.

Explanation Cards

All entries must have a fully-completed 4-H Clothing and Textile Exhibit Card (320-04) to qualify for judging. These forms take the place of interview judging at State Fair, so be as thoughtful and comprehensive as possible when sharing the required information.

- This card must be securely attached to each entry except Skills Notebook exhibits. Securely attach the standard 4-H Exhibit tag to exhibits in this class.
- Exhibits are entered and displayed at the risk of the exhibitor; see General 4-H Information – Eligibility.

Note: Each class number includes a blank at the end (), which must be filled with corresponding number for the 4-H member registered age. 4. Junior 5. Intermediate 6. Senior

Beginning Skills: Sewing Level 1

Exhibits must follow the 4-H Project Guidelines For Leaders resource information and recommendations for this level. Fabrics used for this level must be stable medium weight, firmly woven fabrics (cotton or cotton/polyester blend) and felt.

320 101 13() Non-garment item demonstrating machine sewing straight seams, square corners, curved seams, casings, pressing, and /or hems. Items such as (but not limited to): simple stuffed flat toy, beanbags, potholder, book cover, tote bag, pillowcase, pillow, receiving blanket, placemats, etc. using recommended fabrics for this level.

320 101 14() Garment or personal item with casing - Exhibit demonstrating skills in correctly sewing a casing (for draw string or elastic) and one or more of the following: straight or curved seams with appropriate seam finish, pressing, reinforcing crotch seams, casings sewn on top and bottom and/or hem. Items include Apron, mask, pull-on or wrap pants, skirt, shorts, etc.

Basic Skills: Sewing Level 2

The projects must show any of the level 1 skills in addition to 4-H Project Guidelines For Leaders recommendations for levels 2-3. Fabrics used in this level are medium weight woven, with or without OSU Extension 4-H 2024 State Fair Exhibitors Handbook 85 nap and/or knit fabrics (broadcloth, calico, soft denim, gingham, muslin, poplin, chintz, double knits), wool, and/or stable non-bulky knits or polar fleece with minimal stretch (4 inches of fabric stretches to 4¾ inches or less.)

320 101 21() Garment or personal item with a zipper - machine or hand sewn and successfully demonstrating skills attaching a centered, lapped or invisible zipper as well as one or more of the following: machine sewn straight or

curved seams with appropriate seam finish, pressing, gathers, correct attachment of buttons/snaps/hook & eye closures and/or hems. Items include zipper bag, tote, skirt, simple dress or jumper, slacks, etc.

320 101 22() Non-garment made with a zipper - machine or hand sewn and successfully demonstrating skills attaching a centered, lapped or invisible zipper such as a personal accessory, an item for the home, for use in sports, picnics, camping or with animals, a toy, doll, etc. Should also demonstrate one or more of the following: Machine sewn straight or curved seams with appropriate seam finish, pressing, gathers, trimming/grading/clipping/notching for bulk, correct attachment of buttons/snaps/hook & eye closures pressing, and/or hems.

320 101 23() Garment or Outfit with sleeves - machine or hand sewn and successfully demonstrating skills attaching raglan, set-in or kimono sleeves, as well as appropriate seam finish, pressing, reinforcing underarm seams, gathers, trimming/grading/clipping/notching for bulk, correct attachment of buttons/snaps/hook & eye closures hems, etc.

320 101 26() Garment or personal item demonstrating level 2 skills, such as: machine sewn straight or curved seams with appropriate seam finish, pressing, zipper, casings, gathers, reinforced crotch or underarm seams, trimming/grading/clipping/notching for bulk, correct attachment of buttons/snaps/hook & eye closures, hems.

Expanding Skills: Level 3

At this level, the focus must be on improvement of any of the basic skills in and adding new skills found in 4-H Project Guidelines For Leaders recommendations for this level Fabrics at levels 4-5. Fabrics at this level must include one of the following: flannel cotton blends, stripes, plaids, rayon, single knits, stiff denim, linen, tweed, gauze, seersucker, wool, tweed, Crepe de chine, may have moderate stretch (4 inches of fabric stretches to no more than 5 and 3/8 inches)

320 101 31() Garment or personal item, machine or hand sewn, successfully demonstrating skills from levels 3 such as: darts, tucks, zippers, waistband, collars, yokes, cuffs, pockets, appropriate seam finishes for fabrics (French, serged, flat fell, mock flat felled, etc), set in sleeves, ruffles and pleats, applying trim, hook & loop tape, matching fabric design, binding, stitch-in-the-ditch, etc. Items may include shirt or blouse, dress or jumper, purse or tote with pockets, bathrobe, jogging suits, unlined jacket or blazer etc.

320 101 32() Garment with a collar. Machine or hand sewn, demonstrating appropriate interfacing and collar sewn into garment. Additional skills must include appropriate seam finishes for fabrics, pressing, stay stitching, trimming/grading/clipping/notching for bulk, etc.

320 101 33() Non-garment, item for the home, a doll, toy, or garment/accessories for them, or items used in sports, picnics, camping or with animals constructed with recommended fabrics and skills for this level. (this level includes bags with linings)

Fashion Revue Contests

The Fashion Revue provides an opportunity for 4-H members to exhibit the skills learned in their project work. It also provides members an opportunity to increase their personal presentation skills.

The 4-H Fashion Revue is designed to recognize 4-H members who are enrolled in the Clothing & Textiles project.

The objectives are: knowledge of fibers and fabrics, wardrobe selection, clothing construction, comparison shopping, fashion interpretation, understanding of style, good grooming, poise in front of others, and personal presentation skills.

Fashion Revue Guidelines

The content in this section was changed in 2023. Please review carefully.

1. Contestants must be enrolled in a clothing, knitting, or crocheting project for the Construction and Challenge classes. Ready to Wear is open to all 4-H members. All garments/ensembles to be judged must have been purchased or constructed during participation in a 4-H clothing project in the last 12 months.
2. The Fashion Revue has a Construction division, Ready to Wear, and Fashion Revue Challenge. A member may enter up to five entries no more than one class in each division, except construction where a member may enter one each for clothing, knitting, and crocheting.
3. Fashion Revue is modeling of the garment and typed commentary

4-H Fashion Revue Interview Procedures

The content in this section was changed in 2023. Please review carefully.

A. Contestants will participate in a public fashion show where they will have an opportunity to model in a way to showcase their outfit/garment. Judges will score the contestants on their modeling skills at that time. To qualify for a ribbon, a member must participate in both the interview and public show.

- Commentaries will be read as contestant models on stage.

- B. Participants must submit a typed commentary (100-150 words) to be read when they model during the public show. The typed description must be on a regular 8 ½" x 11" sheet of white paper in 14 pt Times New Roman font.
- The typed commentary must focus on the learning, construction, and purpose of the garment as well as the individual's involvement in 4-H, fair, school, or other activities.
 - Be sure you do not include information that would be considered too personal (i.e. size of garment or something really embarrassing) nor provide too much private information (address, town, school, etc.) as these commentaries are read in a public setting.
- C. Explanation Cards: Participants must also bring a copy of the Fashion Revue Card (320-06) with fabric samples and a photo of the participant wearing the garment.

Fashion Revue: Construction

Eligibility: A participant may enter one each in clothing, knitting, and crocheting. At least one piece of the garment in the ensemble must be constructed.

Evaluation: This is a County event that will not be judged.

Photography

Premiums: Blue-\$3.00, Red-\$2.00, White-\$1.00

The following classes are for still photography. Video projects should be entered under Communications.

Members may enter no more than one entry per class and be part of a club entry, Senior and Intermediate members may also enter one exhibit in the Celebrate our World class. All photos must show work done by the member. Public display of exhibits will be at the discretion of 4-H management. Exhibits are entered and displayed at the risk of the exhibitor; see General 4-H Information – Eligibility.

To qualify for judging, a **fully** completed *4-H Photography Exhibit Explanation Card* (241-01) and a Celebrate our World Explanation Form (998-03) if applicable must be attached. Judging criteria are outlined on the *Photography Exhibit Evaluation Form* (241-02). Forms are available at the county Extension offices and on the State 4-H website.

Photography classes are divided by subject matter or technique. If a photo includes more than one type of subject (i.e. people and animals), the member should decide which category is the most appropriate. Digital and film photos will be included in the same class except as restricted by the class description. Color and black & white images will be included in the same class according to subject or technique.

All single images must have one side, the shorter side, no less than 5 inches. The final exhibit size including either mount or mat must be no less than 8"x10" and may not exceed 16"x20". Any commercially available pre-cut mats that accommodate these size ranges are acceptable. Mats or mounts cut by the member must meet the size specifications.

Photos must be either mounted or matted with a rigid backing using any material firm or rigid enough to protect the photos on the backside and should not show when viewing the exhibit. Photos MAY NOT be entered only matted; they must have a backing for protection. The surface which shows from behind mounted only photos or matted photos must be mat board. Poster board is not acceptable for mounting or matting. For more information on matting and mounting please visit the State 4-H website at <http://oregon.4h.oregonstate.edu/special-events/state-fair/cm-expressive-arts>

Exceptions to photo size limits include:

Exhibits must be ready for hanging. **Exhibitor's name, county, and the class number should be printed on the back of the exhibit.** The club Technical Challenge exhibit must be entered under the **club name** and have the names of all club members participating listed on the back.

Attach 4-H Exhibits tags neatly to the lower right-hand corner of the exhibit and on the back of the exhibit. Explanation cards should be attached to the back of the exhibit with the writing visible to the judge. Think neatness and visual appeal when preparing the exhibit for fair.

Both the original image, final image, and detailed description of the process used must be displayed on the front of the exhibit. The final exhibit may be a single composite image.

241 100 16_ Creative uses - one item showing the use or display of images in a creative manner. Images and the item must be the work of the member. Possibilities include: transfer to fabric or wood, shadow box or 3-dimensional display, note/post cards, calendars, posters, photo album or memory book pages, etc

241 100 17_ Technical Challenge – Each year one photography technique will be the featured challenge. Images may be any size, mounted not to exceed 16"x20" overall. The required explanation card should thoroughly explain the process used to capture the image or the process used after-capture (depending on the challenge).

Possible technical challenges include:

- With capture: depth of field, use of light/lighting, low-light, forced perspective, motion blur, HDR, use of juxtaposition, infrared, extended exposure time, macro.
- After-capture: high contrast, digital effect, burning/dodging, vignette, spot color, recoloring, pixelization.

Container Gardening Rachel Brandon, Chair Eligibility: Plants entered in Container Gardening must be grown by the exhibitor. Exhibitors may enter only one exhibit in each class number.

Identification: Member’s name and county must be securely attached to the bottom of each container. Exhibits exceeding 30 pounds or measuring larger than 30” x 30” will not be accepted. Container Gardening Exhibit Information Card (716-02) must be firmly attached to the exhibit and sealed inside **a sandwich bag to keep the card dry**. Please attach to the container with clear packaging tape or duct tape. Selection of herbs is the choice of the 4-H’er.

Evaluation and Explanation: Exhibitors must use the online publication Select and Prepare Herbs for Exhibit (4H 2335) as reference. It Herb tables are found in the Michigan 4-H Guide to Herb Gardening (4-H 2329); however, any herb available in your area of the state may be exhibited.

- Junior herb container garden must include 2 herbs from different species.
- Intermediate herb container garden must include at least 3 herbs from different species.
- Senior herb container garden must include at least 4 herbs of different species.
