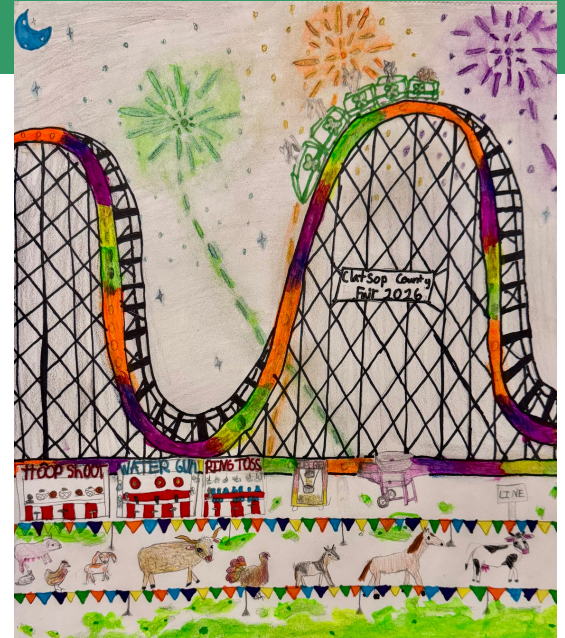

- Finished size should be 2' wide by 3 feet high and include either a casing or dowel for hanging.
- Include your club's name and the 4-H Clover somewhere on the flag. (Minimum Clover size: 4 inches.)
- Use a sturdy but lightweight material, such as felt.
- Finish all edges (turned and stitched, glued, or bound with bias tape) to help prevent curling.
- Flags may be stitched, glued, or assembled in whatever way best fits your club's skills and creativity.

Sewing machines are available at the clubhouse and clubs may contact the office for help with finishing edges.

Fashion Revue July 9th Fairground Hall at 5:30pm

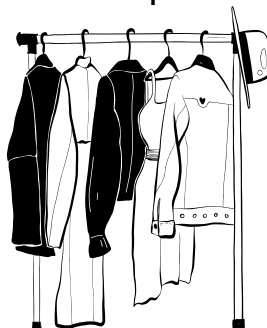

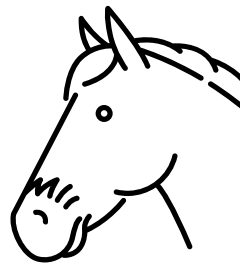

Important Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) Update!

Lactating Dairy Cattle: Cannot be milked in a public area and must have a negative HPAI test within ten days of fair

Waterfowl: Cannot have open access to water for swimming and must have a negative HPAI test within ten days of fair.

If you sign up for one of these exhibits, someone from the extension office will be contacting you in July to get you a free test. You must complete the test and bring it back to the extension office the same day for it to be mailed to the state vet and tested.

What to Include in Your 4-H Resume

Personal Information

- Name, age, club name(s), years in 4-H.

4-H Projects & Skills Learned

- List project areas and specific skills gained (e.g., “Learned livestock care and showmanship” or “Improved sewing techniques”).



Leadership & Community Service



- Include club officer roles, mentoring younger members, and volunteer activities (e.g., food drives, fair clean-up).

Presentations & Public Speaking



- List any demonstrations, speeches, or contests you’ve participated in, and awards earned.

Awards & Fair Participation



- Mention fair ribbons, special awards, and scholarships.

Additional 4-H Involvement

- Camps, workshops, fundraising, or special programs.

Must have 1 Leadership, 1 community service, 1 presentation, and 1 4-H activity outside of fair or a combination of these totaling 6.

ALL projects require paper pre-registration forms. The categories listed below may be entered even if you are not enrolled in that project area—simply include them on your paper registration form.

- Creative Writing
- Computer/Science/Technical Classes
- Educational Displays (no record needed)
- Honeybees & Bees
- Judging Contest (no record needed)
- Legos
- Science, Engineering, Tech
- Table setting (no record needed)
- Flower Arranging Contest (no record needed)



NOTE: Bring project records to the fair for all projects (unless otherwise noted), as they may be used for tie-breakers.

Important Requirements

Phase Reminder: If you are in a project with Skills or Phases (example: Clothing), you need to enter your projects in one phase/level ONLY, you cannot enter items in different Skill Levels. The goal is to move up in Levels throughout your 4-H career.

All members will need to pick-up their Fair packet with the QR codes, Exhibit tags, and Explanation cards. You will need to make sure everything is filled out properly and attached before fair with your hall items. This is a state requirement, and items could be disqualified if not filled out completely.

- Find the correct QR tag and attach it (read the Exhibitor Guide for tag placement, some specify)
- Fill out the Explanation Card for that project and attach to the project.
- Packets available Monday July 6th



We use the i Pads for judging, and we scan the QR code on the Exhibitor tag. Each item needs to have this tag. PLEASE DO NOT LOSE THIS PACKET.

Delivering Static (Hall) Exhibits & Interview Judging – 4-H projects will be delivered to the WEST side of the exhibit hall.

Cloverbud Projects

The 4-H Cloverbuds (ages 5-8) members that were enrolled by April 30 can bring many projects to Fair.

June 10th: Cloverbuds Skills Contest registration is due.

June 17th: Cloverbuds must register for their Fair Entries.

June 30th : Cloverbuds Fashion Revue registration is due.

There will be teen 4-H members available so Cloverbud members can do “Interview Show & Tell” with their hall items on Sunday, July 19th during Static entry.

Cloverbud members may bring Small Animals to Fair in an exhibition event if you have been working with a leader in these projects. The Cloverbud Animal Show & Tell will be 5-6:30pm Tuesday July 21st.

Record Books are not required from Cloverbud members, nor are the Fair requirements of leadership, community service, activity outside of Fair, or presentations (optional).

Cloverbud members cannot bring livestock, horses or dogs.

The Meaning of 4-H Ribbon Colors

4-H is about learning, not just ribbons. Judging doesn't start at purple and work down—each ribbon has its own meaning and value in the learning process.

White Ribbon

The exhibit did not meet all minimum standards, but it still holds value and effort.

Red Ribbon

The exhibit is average. It meets requirements and shows improving skills, with areas for growth.

Blue Ribbon

The exhibit exceeds minimum standards with only minor flaws.

Champion Ribbon

The exhibit is outstanding, nearly flawless, and demonstrates a high level of skill.



Reminder: Judging is one person's opinion on one day. If a 4-H'er learned something, they're already a winner—no matter the ribbon color. Everyone is a purple ribbon person at heart!

- Join us for a Pancake Feed starting at 9am over by the Chicken Coop. From 9am to Noon remember to collect your hall exhibits. From 10am to 2pm is release of all animals and tear down of pens.
- All goat, swine, sheep, and non-market poultry and rabbit pens must be taken down. All cattle stalls must be thoroughly cleaned.
- Market turkeys, chickens, and rabbits going to the processor with Misty Ogier must be left with a full bucket of clean water. No food should be given after the night of the auction. Any extra market poultry or rabbits must be checked out with Misty to ensure the correct animals are being sent.

**Shavings must be removed from the Market Poultry pens.

Judges Corner

Jessica Juvinall Sheep & Meat Goat Judge

Jessica Juvinall grew up in central point, Oregon primarily showing sheep, and goats but also cattle, and hogs. Jessica attended Blinn College in Texas before transferring to Oklahoma state where She graduated with a bachelor's degree in animal science. Jessica judged while at Blinn College and on the 2018 Oklahoma State judging team where her team was named the 2018 National Champion livestock judging team. She has been judging multiple species at shows across the country since graduating college. In her free time, Jessica enjoys rodeoing, hunting, golfing and boating. Jessica is excited to sort the livestock and work with the exhibitors.

Sandi Weishaupt Swine Judge

Part time livestock sorter, full time future entrepreneur, Sandi wants to live in a world where meat animal protein and desserts are the only two food groups. And family farms have an EBITDA margin over 20%. She began evaluating animal quality and potential on her family's Nevada commercial cattle operation and grew up competing in 4-H and FFA. Sandi judged competitively for Oregon State and will never stop loving the smell of arena shavings. As a lover of all things kids and show stock, Sandi has been found across the western US, at jackpots, breed and junior shows, and state/ county fairs. She likes Goats, Sheep, cattle and hogs but her favorite species to work with is kids. When she's not holding a mic in her hand, she's at the gym, trying to make it rain, watching Ringside Live, Or hugging cows.

Expectations: First impression: Clean hog. Well maintained skin and hair. I don't know your rules on product and hair length, but no matter what hogs should be rinsed/washed a couple or times per week during the summer and daily hair brushing to train the hair. If it is warm on show day (especially since we start in the afternoon) I like the hogs to be well misted with water before they come in the showing so they stay cool. Clip the face and trim up belly and long hairs on tail to make hog appear youthful. Blend clip job from face to neck.... hair should be a natural length, not bald.

Showman - hair pulled back out of face, appropriate 4H, FFA or fair designated attire. Smiling or serious facial expressions as long it is natural, and not forced. Boots or shoes clean and tucked under the pant leg. Eye contact exudes confidence and is balanced between planning/positioning hog and being aware of me. A successful showperson knows their project inside and out ... their management and feeding program and I will confirm by questioning the exhibitors. The whip can be either hand, but the free hand needs to be up off the back of the pig (the position of the free hand and body position has a new trend and I would encourage everyone to watch the upcoming national shows -showmanship classes on Ringside Live to get a feel for it.)

Control - Project responds to light touch of whip on snout/jaw to turn, under the jaw to get head up, and past the midsection (or hip) for forward motion/speed. Turns should be soft arching turns and a drive pattern should give me all views. Hogs need to work about 7 to 10 feet out from me and keep control off the rail. I prefer the hogs to travel at a natural speed, somewhere between the zoomies and turtle. Exhibitors need to be able to stop and shutdown their hogs if I ask.

Cati Foss Dog Agility Judge

I will always try to mention what went well even with an NQ. I know children need some encouragement as showing is exceptionally difficult with an animal. I am fair and honest, I won't just pass a child because they are a child. I am always willing to answer questions as long as it doesn't interfere with my ability to do the job. I want every child to feel empowered to seek knowledge that will help them.

Tim Miller Dog Obedience, Rally, and Showmanship Judge
