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GENERAL RULES

4-H ELIGIBILITY

1. Exhibiting in the 4-H Pre-Fair is restricted to members enrolled in 4-H club work in Umatilla County by January 31 of the current year.
2. Unless otherwise specified, members may only participate in project areas they are currently enrolled in. Members with entries in project areas they are not currently enrolled may be deemed ineligible for awards and premiums.
3. Members must enter their proper phase or skill level according to their age division and advancements. Members are only eligible for one skill level in each project area.
4. All exhibits shall be the member's own 4-H project for the current club year.
5. Age groups for all contests and exhibitors shall be as follows, unless noted in the appropriate section:
 - CLOVERBUDS:** Ages 5-8 on Sept. 1, 2024. Limited exhibit areas. No large animal livestock, horse, dog, shooting sports, or live contests. **NOT ELIGIBLE FOR ANY PRE-FAIR CONTESTS.** However, Camp Cloverbud takes place on July 17, in conjunction with the Pre-Fair.
 - NOVICE:**
 - Static** - First-year static project JUNIOR member age 9-11 on Sept. 1, 2024
 - Livestock/Small Animal** - First-year livestock project JUNIOR member age 9-11 on Sept. 1, 2024
 - Horse and Shooting Sports** - First-year horse or shooting sports project member, regardless of age
 - Dog** - First-year dog project JUNIOR member age 9-11 on Sept. 1, 2024
(Obedience classes are based on the level of the dog.)
 - JUNIOR:** ages 9-11 on Sept. 1, 2024
 - INTERMEDIATE:** ages 12-14 on Sept. 1, 2024
 - SENIOR:** ages 15-19 on Sept. 1, 2024
6. The Umatilla County horse registration deadline is April 1 of the current year.

4-H ADMINISTRATION

1. The individual member must do all the preparation and care of exhibits and necessary preparation for contests.
2. Failure to comply with pre-fair rules and cooperate with 4-H staff will result in forfeiture of premiums.

4-H PREMIUMS

4-H premiums will be awarded according to the following point system guidelines:

1. Points will be awarded at the Novice, Junior, Intermediate, and Senior levels. Points will be awarded for Pre-Fair events.
2. Premium points are determined by ribbon placing as follows:
(The numbers represent points, not a dollar amount)
 - **Blue – 5 points**
 - **Red – 4 points**
 - **White – 3 points**
3. Champion and Reserve Champion will receive no additional points.
4. The monetary value of a point will be determined after both the Pre-Fair and County Fair, based on the total points awarded and monies allocated for premiums.
5. In case there are low exhibitor numbers or entries are deemed unworthy of the prize offered, the points will be awarded at the discretion of the judge. No champion ribbons will be awarded to class winners unless they are blue ribbon or first premium quality.

4-H RIBBONS

4-H judging will take place with the Danish Merit System, awarding class entries a blue, red, or white ribbon. Champions and Reserve Champions may be selected when the judge deems there are entries of championship quality. Champions and Reserve Champions will be selected from blue ribbon winners only. Ribbons and their relative standing are:

Champion: Best in the class

Reserve Champion: Second best in the class

Blue Ribbon: an exhibit that is excellent and meets the established standards for the class.

Red Ribbon: an exhibit that is good but has room for improvement.

White Ribbon: an exhibit that meets class requirements but shows a need for considerable improvement.

Participation Ribbon: given when an exhibit does not meet the requirements of the class. (Display only)

Cloverbuds: recognition of participation

STATE FAIR ENTRIES

1. The judge will designate participants for State Fair quality at the time the contests are judged.
2. Only Intermediate and Seniors are eligible for State Fair entries which require their attendance to participate. Juniors are eligible to send exhibits for judging. Juniors cannot participate in any in-person contests such as food preparation contests, judging contests, livestock exhibits, etc.
3. For those members eligible to participate in the State Fair Horse Show, the deadline for State Fair Horse Show entries is Friday, July 25, 2025.
4. All other Pre-Fair entries qualifying for State Fair must be registered through the onsite 4-H Office by Saturday, August 9.

LIVE CONTESTS

4-H FCS SKILL-A-THON

To prepare for the FCS Classic Contest, please visit the Oregon 4-H [Family and Consumer Science Classic webpage](#).

1. To participate, individuals must be enrolled in 4-H Foods & Nutrition, Clothing & Textiles and/or Interior Design projects.
2. Contest will consist of (1) 25 item ID quiz for clothing/sewing, (1) 25 item ID quiz for foods/cooking, and (2) judging (scenario) classes, one clothing/sewing and one foods/cooking.
3. Only official contest materials may be used during the contest. Members using materials other than those allowed will be disqualified. Members are not allowed to have cell phones out in the judging area.
4. No talking is allowed by 4-H members after the contest has begun. If 4-H members have a question regarding the contest, they should address that question to the superintendent. Parents and Volunteers must stay back from the competition space and tables.

4-H PRESENTATIONS

Classes are open to all 4-H members. These guidelines are to be used for all project areas. Judging criteria are outlined on the Oregon 4-H [Presentation Evaluation sheets for Demonstrations and Illustrated Talks \(211-001\)](#), [Public Speaking \(211-002\)](#), and [Impromptu Speaking \(211-003\)](#) available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, or on the state 4-H website.

1. 4-H Presentation divisions include demonstrations, illustrated talks, public speeches, and impromptu speeches.
2. Members may have **one entry in each class** if the subject matter is different for each.
3. All contestants will be interviewed by the judge after their presentation.
4. Each contestant must supply all his or her equipment. A table and chart stand will be available.
5. All project areas compete together.
6. **Contests are time-restricted. See contest areas for times.**
7. If members of a team are in two different age divisions, the team will be entered in the highest age division.
8. Intermediate and Senior members may be chosen for the State Fair competition; **Junior members may participate at the county level only.**

DEMONSTRATIONS AND ILLUSTRATED TALKS

A **demonstration** shows how to do something. There is a finished product at the end. An **illustrated talk** is a way to share information with the use of visual aids.

1. The topic may be anything the member wants to share with others.
2. A member may not present the same topic more than once at the County or State Fair level.
3. Teams will consist of two members. If members of a presentation team are in two different age divisions, the team must compete in the higher age group.
4. Each team or individual will have time to set up, present, and clear the area. The actual presentation time is as follows: **Juniors 3-10 minutes and Intermediate/Senior 10-15 minutes.**
5. Each contestant must supply all his or her equipment. A table and chart stand will be available. If other special equipment is needed, contact the 4-H office before the fair.
6. The use of notes is permitted. However, the excessive use of notes may be counted against the contestant at the judge's discretion.
7. During the presentation, contestants should introduce themselves by name, club, county, and topic.
8. Contestants should cite their major references after their presentation. (Citing references is not included in the time.)
9. Anyone may ask questions of the contestant after the presentation.

3. **Speech times are as follows: Juniors 3-7 minutes and Intermediate/Seniors 7-10 minutes in length.**
4. The use of notes is permitted. However, the excessive use of notes may be counted against the contestant at the judge's discretion.
5. During the speech, contestants should introduce themselves by name, county, and topic.
6. Contestants should cite their major references after their speech. (Citing references is not included in the time.)
7. Anyone may ask questions of the contestant.

1. Contestants will draw topics at random.
2. Once contestants draw a topic, they will have five minutes to prepare before they begin their speech. The contestant may write notes on one 3 x 5-inch notecard, which will be provided.
3. **The speech should be 3 to 5 minutes in length.**
4. During the speech, contestants should introduce themselves by name, county, and topic.
5. A microphone will be provided.
6. No questions may be asked at the conclusion of the speech.

MEASURING CONTEST

Open to Juniors only. Contestants demonstrate correct methods of measuring ingredients such as flour, water, salt, and shortening. Contestants must also show basic measuring skills, such as 3t=1T

FOOD PREPARATION (Foods of the Pacific Northwest)

1. Participants must be enrolled in the Foods and Nutrition project. Each participant must prepare one food product. Judging criteria are outlined in the [4-H Food and Nutrition Contest Score Sheet \(511-17\)](#), available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, or on the state 4-H website.
2. Participants will have **one hour** (start to finish) for set-up, preparation, and cleanup. Participants must provide all ingredients and equipment except the range, microwave oven, and refrigerator.
3. Participants will prepare one recipe, one batch, etc., of the food product using **at least two ingredients representative of the Pacific Northwest**. Participants must select a food product that can be prepared within the time limit. For food safety, finished dishes prepared at home may not be brought and served at the pre-fair. Only yeast products that require proofing will be allowed extra time. Proofing time is done with members out of the kitchen. Participants cannot prepare the same recipe for more than one year.
4. The use of alcoholic beverages that would be unlawful for a minor to purchase or possess is not permitted in preparation or included on the menu.
5. Participants are expected to leave the kitchen clean. This is a part of the judge's evaluation.
6. Meals will be judged on efficiency in the kitchen, creativity, nutrition, presentation, taste, cost-effectiveness, and food and kitchen safety.

7. Participants must be in appropriate dress for safe cooking and are expected to follow food and kitchen safety procedures.
8. The food prepared must be displayed on a serving platter or tray, or in a dish, bowl, basket, etc. Participants must also display one place setting of the table service which would be used in serving the food at a meal (include plates, tableware, napkin, glasses, tablecloth, placemat, or whatever is appropriate). A table will be available for each display. A centerpiece may be included but is not required.
9. Participants will serve samples of the food to the judge and the public. Paper plates and plastic utensils will be provided by the Fair.
10. **All participants must provide the judge with a [Foods of the Pacific Northwest Judges Information Form \(511-18\)](#), available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, or on the State 4-H website. This must include the cost and nutritional information for the meal. The recipe for the dish(es) must also be included.**
11. **All participants must provide a poster (approximately 24" x 30") of the recipe to display in the preparation area. Posters will not be returned. Please include member's name, county, and contest name on the poster.**
12. Only Intermediate and Senior participants may compete at the State Fair level. Juniors are not eligible.

MINI-MEAL CONTEST (Intermediates and Seniors only)

1. Members may have **one** entry in both the individual and team classes, if different dishes are prepared for each. Teams will consist of two members. If one team member is a senior and the other an intermediate, the mini-meal should be entered in the senior division.
2. Each participant (or team) must prepare only two dishes. One must be a main dish and the other can be any other food that would either (a) make an entire meal if served together, or (b) be part of a larger meal if other foods were included.
3. The meal might be breakfast, lunch, dinner, brunch, buffet supper, snack meal, party meal, etc. Members can utilize food products they have preserved.
4. Participants will have two hours (start to finish) for set-up, preparation, and cleanup. Participants must provide all ingredients and equipment except the range, microwave oven, and refrigerator. For food safety, finished dishes prepared at home may not be brought and served at the pre-fair.
5. Participants should prepare one recipe, one batch, etc., of food product. No fixed number of servings is required.
6. The use of alcoholic beverages that would be unlawful for a minor to possess is not permitted.
7. The foods prepared must be displayed on a serving platter or tray, or in a dish, bowl, basket, etc. Participants must also display one place setting of the table service that would be used in serving the meal (include plates, tableware, napkin, glasses, tablecloth, placemat, or whatever is appropriate). A card table will be available for each participant to use for display. A centerpiece may be included if the participant wishes but is not required.
8. Participants will serve samples of the food to the judge and the public. Paper plates and plastic utensils will be provided by the Fair.
9. **All participants must provide the judge with a completed [Mini Meal Contest Judge's Information Sheet \(511-21\)](#) available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, or on the state 4-H website, which includes cost and nutritional information for the meal. Recipes for each dish must be included.**
10. **All participants must provide a poster (approximately 24" x 30") of the recipe to display in the preparation area. Posters will not be returned.**
11. Participants are expected to leave the kitchens clean. This will be part of the judge's evaluation. QUICK MEAL CHALLENGE (Intermediates and Seniors only)

1. Participants will have **15 minutes for set-up, 30 minutes for preparation and cooking, and 15 minutes for cleanup** after sharing the meal with the judge. The preparation and cooking time is to be a maximum of 30 minutes. Participants must provide all ingredients and equipment except the range, microwave oven, and refrigerator.
2. **Participants should prepare breakfast, lunch, or dinner for two people.** For food safety, finished dishes prepared at home may not be served or used as ingredients. Mixes or convenience ingredients, such as pre-grated cheese, may be included as ingredients but not as stand-alone dishes.
3. The use of alcoholic beverages that would be unlawful for a minor to purchase or possess is not permitted.
4. The food prepared must be displayed on a serving platter or tray, or in a dish, bowl, basket, etc. Participants must also display two place settings which would be used in serving the food at a meal (include plates, tableware, napkin, glasses, tablecloth, placemat, or whatever is appropriate). Participants will serve samples of the food to the judge.
5. **All participants must provide the judge with a completed [Mini Meal Contest Judge's Information Sheet \(511-21\)](#)** available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, or on the state 4-H website, which includes cost and nutritional information for the meal. Recipes for each dish must be attached.
6. **All participants must provide a poster (approximately 24" x 30") of the recipe to display in the preparation area. Posters will not be returned. Please include the 4-H member's name, county, and contest name on the poster.**
7. Participants should be in appropriate dress for safe cooking and are expected to follow food and kitchen safety procedures. Participants are expected to leave the kitchen clean. This will be part of the judge's evaluation.

4-H FASHION REVUE **July 16, 2025 - EOTEC** **Superintendent: Judy Bracher**

1. Participants must be enrolled in a clothing, knitting, or crocheting project. All garments/ensembles to be judged must have been purchased or constructed during participation in a 4-H clothing and textiles project in the last 12 months.

2. Members may enter up to five entries, with no more than one class in each division, except construction, where a member may enter one each for clothing, knitting, and crocheting. (i.e., one ready-to-wear, one challenge, and up to three construction, one in each division)
3. Judging criteria are outlined on the [Fashion Revue Contest Evaluation Form \(320-05\)](#), available from the County Extension Offices, the Umatilla County 4-H website, or on the state 4-H website.
4. Fashion Revue is a combination of an interview/oral presentation, modeling of the garment, and a response to judges' questions. The contest will be broken into two parts: personal interview and fashion revue modeling.
5. Participants will provide a typed commentary (100-150 words) to be read when they model during the public fashion revue that will take place that evening, Wednesday, July 10th at 7 pm. The typed commentary must focus on the learning, construction, and purpose of the garment rather than the individual's involvement in 4-H, fair, school, or other activities.
6. Contestants will participate in a public fashion show where they will have an opportunity to model in a way to showcase their outfit/garment. To qualify for a ribbon, a member must participate in both the interview and the public show.

FASHION REVUE INTERVIEW PROCEDURES

1. Introduction/Presentation

- Each contestant will start by introducing themselves and model their garment to the judges. Participants will then provide a 2-3 minute presentation to the judges. During the presentation, the participants need to describe their project activities, outfit selection, construction or buying skills and their knowledge of fiber and fabrics. Areas that will be judged are outlined on the [Fashion Revue Contest Evaluation Form \(320-05\)](#)

2. Question and Answer

- Judges will have the opportunity to ask each participant questions from the list of contest questions as well as questions related directly to the participant's garment or project experiences. Refer to the [Fashion Revue Interview Question Bank](#) for a list of possible questions.

JUDGING BREAKDOWN

- 20% - Oral Presentation Skills
- 15% - Content of Oral Presentation
- 25% - Appearance of Garment
- 20% - Responses to Judge's Questions
- 20% - Modeling

FASHION REVUE CONSTRUCTION

1. Members may enter **one** each in clothing, knitting, and crocheting.
2. At least one piece of the garment in the ensemble must be constructed.

FASHION REVUE READY TO WEAR

1. This contest is designed to focus on wardrobe planning, choosing clothing that looks great on the member's body type and coloring, and choosing clothing that projects their personality and lifestyle.
2. All elements of the ensemble must be purchased within the last 12 months, except for one previously owned or borrowed accessory item (shoes, jewelry, etc.).
3. There are NO cost parameters for this contest; participants must submit receipts for all purchased items and a completed [Ready to Wear Buying Entry Form](#) and [Ready to Wear Consumer Comparison Worksheet](#).
4. All garments worn (visible garments – i.e., blouse under jacket or vest) during the contest must be included in the buying worksheet.
5. The commentary must include the thought process in putting the outfit together, such as why they used the pieces they did, why the outfit fits their body style, and /or how it works into their wardrobe and lifestyle. In other words, why this outfit works for them.
6. Participants must be prepared to answer up to five questions found in the "Ready to Wear" section of the [Fashion Revue Interview Question Bank](#).

4-H TABLE SETTING CONTEST

July 16, 2025 - EOTEC

Superintendent: Kristina Knudsen

1. **No food is prepared for this contest.**
2. Participants are to do their own work and must be present for judging. A maximum of 15 minutes will be allowed to set up their display. The judge will interview contestants after the display is set up. A maximum of 10 minutes will be allotted for the interview.
3. A table will be provided with a marked space of 18” deep x 25” wide for the place setting. The contestant must bring all other supplies.
4. Select a theme. The table setting may be for breakfast, lunch, or dinner, and may range from a picnic to a formal meal. All must be appropriate for the theme/menu being served. Paper plates, plasticware, and paper napkins may be used for casual themes. Centerpieces are acceptable if appropriate.

6. Only utensils necessary for the meal should be placed on the table. Napkins, if used, need to be folded by the member during the contest.
7. Alcoholic beverage containers or glasses are not allowed, nor should alcohol be included in the menu.
8. All items must be safe to eat from, with no cracks or chips. They must be clean with no water spots or fingerprints.
9. Refer to [Table Setting Guidelines \(999-06\)](#) for proper table setting.
10. Be prepared to answer any questions the judge might ask about the place setting, the menu, and/or nutritional values.
11. **NOTE: All table settings will also be required to be on display during the Umatilla County Fair. Participants will bring their table setting to the Event Center on Sunday, August 3rd, during static check-in.** OSU Extension Service, Umatilla County 4-H, and the Umatilla County Fair are not responsible for theft, loss, or damage to display items. The contestant is responsible for their own property.

1. Cupcake Wars is a county-only contest.
2. Each team will consist of 2 chefs. Teams will compete against other teams of the same age level. If a team has two different age division members, it will compete at the highest level.
3. There will be two rounds to the contest. Teams will have 1 hour for completion of each round. (2 hours total)
4. The team will work together for the duration of the event and will have one chef and one assistant, who will then trade roles at the start of the second round.
5. Designs must meet the theme requirements.
Design themes for 2025: 1st round: Disney Heroes and 2nd round: Wild West
6. Materials provided by 4-H for each team are:
 - One table (2' x 8') with access to electrical outlets.
 - One 6-count cupcake baker
 - Refrigerator
 - Tub for dirty dishes. (Sink access will be in the main kitchen area of EOTEC, not directly where the contest is being held.)
7. All participants are required to use the provided 6-count cupcake baker. The bakers are nonstick, self-contained cupcake ovens that bake 6 cupcakes in 7-10 minutes, depending on the cupcake batter.
8. Teams **MUST** bring all supplies needed for the 2 rounds. The only supplies provided are listed above. Teams must plan on bringing ALL baking ingredients and equipment they will need, including plates, trays, or a creative item

to present their cupcakes to the judge.

A few other items to consider bringing:

- Trash bags for your station
- Hand sanitizer
- Timer for your baking (cell phones are not permitted)

9. Teams are to make their cupcakes and icing from scratch recipes. If decorative items (e.g., elaborate fondant flowers, chocolate work that requires specialized equipment, etc.) are made in advance, teams are to bring photo documentation of the items they have made in advance to the judge during their contest.
9. Participants must bring a set of utensils, bowls, and other equipment for each of the 2 cupcake rounds.
10. Open heat sources (e.g., hot plates, torches, butane burners, etc.) are NOT allowed. Equipment with open flames is not allowed, in accordance with the Fire Marshall.
12. One microwave will be available for all teams to use. If you intend to use the microwave, please bring microwave-safe dishes to use.
13. Teams are allowed to bring tablecloths and table displays if they would like. Table displays must fit on your table and not interfere with the judge's ability to maneuver through the competition space.
14. Cell phones are not allowed to be used. Use of cell phones will be grounds for disqualification.
15. Dishes will not be required to be completed, or be part of the overall scoring of the contest.
16. During the competition, participants are NOT allowed to receive help from family, friends, or the public. Non-competitors are spectators and CANNOT participate or help, including coaching, providing additional supplies/equipment, washing participants' equipment, etc. Any violations will result in the team's disqualification.

Silhouettes dislodged, moved, or canted by the action of a ricochet or another silhouette will NOT be considered a miss. information will be provided to qualifiers after the County Horse Show.

8. Novice and Junior horse exhibitors are NOT eligible for the State Fair.
9. To qualify for State Fair in showmanship and equitation (hunt seat, saddle seat, or western), contestants must have received a minimum combined score of 170 (in equitation and showmanship) at their county fair, and each individual score must be 80 points or higher. In addition, they must have used the same horse in both classes and at the county level. For members who ride multiple seats, the highest equitation score must be used to determine eligibility. Then, if members have received blue ribbons in other seats on the same horse, they may ride those seats as well.
10. Contestants who qualify for the State Fair in equitation/showmanship may also enter trail if they received a blue ribbon using the same horse as used in equitation/showmanship.
11. Contestants who qualify for State Fair in ground training or with a non-ridden animal in reinsmanship or precision driving may also enter in-hand trail if they received a blue ribbon in that event using the same equine.
12. Contestants who qualify for State Fair in equitation/showmanship may also enter dressage if they received a score of 58% or higher on any Dressage Training Level Test 2 or 3 or any First Level test at their county fair using the same horse as used in equitation/showmanship and at the county level. NOTE: Training Level Test 1 is not eligible for the State Fair.
13. Additionally, contestants who qualify for the State Fair in equitation/showmanship may also enter Western Dressage if they received a score of 58% or higher on WDAA Basic Level Test 2-4 or Level 1 Test 1-4. NOTE: Basic Level, Test 1 is not eligible for the State Fair.
14. A member who scores 62% or higher at the horse show must progress up to the next test the following year. (The requirement to move up does not apply to a new horse or in test change years.)
